Georgina Dodge, associate vice provost for Ohio State's Office of Minority Affairs, and her Doberman, Barnum, enjoyed their walks together until Barnum was seriously injured by a deer on the morning of Nov. 1.

"He came bouncing out of the trees and his intestines were hanging out of a hole in his side," Dodge said. "It was amazing that he was still walking."

The resilient dog is now recovering from an attack by a buck in Whetstone Park, located in the Northeast region of Columbus.

Dodge rescued Barnum when he was just a little more than a year old and was recovering from a shot to his head. Now six years old, she has become very fond of her well behaved, funloving Doberman.

# **Former account** clerk charged with theft

A former Ohio State employee with a previous embezzlement conviction has now been charged with stealing \$13,564 from OSU while employed in the University Libraries' business office, according to OSU police and court records.

Wendy L. Adcock, a 39-yearold former account clerk in the administrative services department for University Libraries, was indicted Sept. 14 and charged with theft and theft in office during the period of August 2006 to December 2006, said Rick Amweg, director of public safety for OSU police.

Adcock entered a plea of not guilty on both counts at her Nov. 7 arraignment and was released on a \$5,000 bond, according to court records.

Adcock is currently serving a three-year probation after pleading guilty to theft at her previous embezzlement trial in March 2006.

She was indicted September 2005 on counts of theft and tampering with records for stealing more than \$11,000 from the Obetz Comfort Inn, her employer at the time, during the period of October 2004 to March 2005, according to court records.

Adcock was hired by University Libraries, July 15, 2005.

Adcock as the suspect. "She was an employee of the

university and was in an assignment that involved handling money," Amweg said. "She was able to move university funds to her own use.'

Police refused to provide details of how Adcock was able to steal the money or how she was implicated as the prime suspect because the investigation is ongoing and evidence is currently being prepared to be presented in court, Amweg said.

Adcock resigned from University Libraries Jan. 25, giving the customary two weeks notice, to accept a position as an office administrative associate with General Internal Medicine for the OSU College of Medicine, said Larry Allen, a spokesman for University Libraries. Allen refused to say whether Adcock resigned before or after the police investigation began, but he did mention she left on her own initiative.

University spokesman Jim Lynch said Adcock's employment with OSU ended Friday, Nov. 16.

A trial date has yet to be set. If Adcock is found guilty of the current charges against her, she will serve an 11-month jail sentence for violating the terms of her probation according to court documents detailing the terms of OSU police were notified in her probation, in addition to the January 2007 of discrepancies in sentence she would receive for



#### **MTV goes to Middle East**

DUBAI- MTV is hoping hip-hop and reality television tailored and sanitized for a more conservative Middle East will draw young Arabs away from platform for Arab youth to break dozens of locally produced boundaries music video channels that already dominate the market.

He explained that there will be "culturally sensitive editors going through content of the programming.

The station launched at midnight Saturday, airing a pre-taped show featuring Grammy award-winning rapper and Ludacris, actor Senegalese-born soul superstar Akon, Lebanese rapper Karl Wolf and the Emirates underground hip-hop band Desert Heat.

By emphasizing local music talent and programs addressing the concerns of Arab youth, MTV Arabia hopes to set itself apart from the other satellite music channels that saturate the as long as you don't lose Mideast market.

We are not only a music channel, we are an entertainment channel where young Arabs will get a voice," program director Patrick Samaha said to The Associated Press.

Unlike its past forays into Europe and India, MTV is not entering a virgin music video territory. Throughout the past few years, there has been an explosion of satellite channels in the region that feature soulful male crooners from the Gulf and female singers from Lebanon and Syria.

MTV officials say this is why their channel is focusing on hip-hop and R&B, two music genres that are underserved popular throughout the region.

But to please a more conservative audience, MTV Arabia will tailor some of its programming and keep provocative hip-hop videos featuring barely dressed women and alcohol to a minimum.

Her poise contrasted sharply with her description of the ride

from her house in Sydney to her parents' home in another part of the city for dinner on Jan. 23, 2005.

Kidman described hunkering down in the car's back seat leaning over in her chair in the witness stand to demonstrate to try to avoid being spotted by photographer Jamie Fawcett.

"I was frightened and I was worried there was going to be an accident," Kidman said.

# Analysis of FBI stats puts 4 Ohio cities on dangerous cities list

DETROIT — In another blow to the Motor City's tarnished image, Detroit pushed past St. Louis to become the nation's most dangerous city, according to a private research group's controversial analysis, released Sunday, of annual FBI crime statistics

The study drew harsh criticism even before it came out. The American Society of Criminology launched a pre-emptive strike Friday, issuing a statement attacking it as "an irresponsible

misuse" of crime data. The 14th annual "City Crime Rankings: Crime in Metropolitan America" was published by CQ Press, a unit of Congressional Quarterly Inc. It is based on the FBI's Sept. 24 crime statistics report.

The report looked at 378 cities with at least 75,000 people based on per-capita rates for homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary and auto theft. Each crime category was considered separately and weighted based on its seriousness, CQ Press said.

Last year's crime leader, St. Last year's crime leader, St. Louis, fell to No. 2. Another Michigan city, Flint, ranked third, followed by Oakland Calif.; Camden, N.J.; Birming-ham, Ala.; North Charleston, S.C.; Memphis, Tenn.; Richmond, Calif.; and Cleveland, which was ranked the 10th most dangerous city. city


Three other Ohio cities made the Top 25 list: Youngstown was million people since 1950, No. 15, Cincinnati was No. 16 according to the Census and Dayton was No. 19.

Toledo was ranked the 47th most dangerous city, and Colum-bus was 48th.

The study ranked Mission Viejo, Calif., as the safest U.S. city, followed by Clarkstown, N.Y.; Brick Township, N.J.; Amherst, N.Y.; and Sugar Land, Texas. Parma, a suburban Cleve-

land city, was ranked 23rd. CQ Press spokesman Ben Krasney said details of the weighting system were propri-etary. It was compiled by Kathleen O'Leary Morgan and Scott Morgan, whose Morgan Quitno Press published it until its acquisition by CQ Press.

The study assigns a crime score to each city, with zero representing the national average. Detroit got a score of 407, while St. Louis followed at Conference of Mayors.

# **Holiday events** around nation include fruitcake chucking, Disney

NEW YORK — In Maine, Santa arrives by lobster boat. In San Diego, they chuck fruitcakes for charity. And in Florida, Cinderella Castle is getting all dressed up for Christmas.

That's how a few places around the country are gearing up for the holidays. Here are the details, along with other events.

Disney World has a new Cinderella Holiday Wish show that transforms Cinderella Castle into a shimmering ice palace with 200,000 lights. The show started Nov. 12 at the park in Lake Buena Vista, Fla., near Orlando.

In California on Dec. 2, the Fruitcake Chuck-n-Hurl takes place in San Diego, where locals will toss their onepound cakes into trash cans to raise money for charity. It's part of Deck the Palms, a warm-weather holiday celebration at Seaport Village, on the San Diego waterfront, that includes a Santa with a surfboard, sand sculptures and decorations on palm trees instead of evergreens.

In Maine on Dec. 2 at 2 p.m., Santa arrives by lobster boat at the Landing Restaurant in Kennebunkport. The event is part of a festival called Christmas Prelude, 30-Dec. Nov. http://www.christmaspre-

lude.com. Elsewhere in Maine, in Boothbay Harbor on Dec. 1, Santa and friends take part in a celebration that includes a lighted boat

parade, craft fair, caroling and Christmas tree lighting.

Newport Beach, Calif., holds its 99th annual Christmas Boat Parade, Dec. 12-Dec. 16. A hundred boats - from kayaks to yachts, elaborately lit and decorated, some bearing carolers - take part in the event, which is seen by a million people over five nights. The flotilla travels 14 miles around the harbor beginning at 6:30 p.m. each night. Also in Newport Beach, the forest meets the ocean at the Fashion Island shopping plaza, where you can get a view of the Pacific while visiting a 115-foot-tall white fir. tree decorated with 17,000 lights and ornaments.

Other nautical Christmas events include the Argosy Christmas Ship, which sails to different communities on the Puget Sound in the Seattle area each night from Dec. 1-23, with choirs on board performing 20-minute concerts at each port and money raised for various charities; the Alexandria Holiday Boat Parade of Lights in Virginia, Dec. 1-2, when litup boats line the Potomac River; and the colorful parade of boats at the annual Winter-' fest, Dec. 15, along the Intracoastal Waterway at Hugh Taylor Birch State Park in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

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

CINCINNATI — Diana Blasingame has lately found herself having to go to a free food pantry once a month to feed herself and her teenage daughter.

"I'm pretty good at making wholesalers and retailers are things stretch as far as I can, but food is so high now and I have to have gas in my car to do my job," said Blasingame, 46, who earns \$9 an hour as a home health aide. "I work full time, but I don't have health insurance and sometimes there just isn't enough to pay bills years, and I can't believe how and buy food."

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# Carr out of gas

Michigan coach calls it quits after 13 seasons

ANN ARBOR, Mich. Lloyd Carr alternately choked up and chuckled for nearly 40 minutes Monday, as he announced his 13th season as Michigan football coach will be his last.

'I wanted to be able to walk out of here knowing that to the very last minute, I did my job to the best of my ability," Carr said with watery eyes. "And I know I'll be able to do that."

The best of Carr's ability brought Michigan a national title and five Big Ten champi-onships. It also included an unsightly loss to Appalachian State to open this season and a fourth consecutive defeat and sixth in seven years to Jim Tressel and Ohio State to close it.

Many of those memories were very close to the surface at Monday's news conference during which the public that rarely got to see his true personality also learned what had happened behind closed doors the previous day when Carr broke the news to his

# Leclaire brings new life to French language

laughs Several were exchanged as a jaunty Pascal Leclaire visited a French 104 class held in Hagerty Hall Monday.

As part of the Foreign Language Center's GOAL (Go Local, Go Global) events program, Leclaire came to OSU to give students a chance to converse the French language with a native speaking celebrity. Wynne Wong, director of the French Basic Learning program, helped to arrange Leclaire's visit. Wong said she was very enthusiastic about the learning aspect of his visitation.

"It's an opportunity for them to use the language in a real-life setting. We have so few opportunities in Columbus to have a French environment," Wong said. "They're able to find out information about a celebrity using the target language.'

Karen Sobul encourages the program and believes it is a helpful experience for foreign

language students "What your getting is this special knowledge of culture that you're not necessarily learning in the classroom," Sobul said. 'Between his jokes, Leclaire gave the students a first-hand experience with the French language, and the students managed to retain some knowledge.

"He taught us some cool words we hadn't heard before. It was real laid back and it's good to talk to somebody who knew French and understood what we were saying instead of trying to teach us," McPherson said.
