OSU: The birthplace of presidents

Ohio State not only gives students the opportunity to "Do Something Big," it also trains its deans for more illustrious positions — at other universities. Because of OSU's reputation, many deans have been recruited from the university for more prominent positions such as university presidents, vice presidents, chancellors, creators of new academic programs, and even head of the American Red Cross.

Since the fall of 1997 at least half of OSU's 24 deans have left their positions at the university, according to a Summary of Position Turnover by the Office of Human Resources and the Office of Academic Affairs. Five of the former deans have become presidents of other universities, two became OSU vice presidents, and one was promoted to president of OSU's Newark Campus. Former Dean Bernadine Healy, who could not be reached for comment, went on to head the American Red Cross.

"Ohio State is a place where people go to look for candidates," said Dave Ferguson, former associate vice president of University Relations and current associate vice chancellor for Public Relations at the State University of New York. "It earned a reputation in the early '90s as the birthplace of presidents."

OSU is considered such a complicated and complex organization that if a dean can be successful here, then he or she can be successful at a lot of other places as well, Ferguson said.

A dean considers many factors when contemplating job offers from other institutions, said Joseph A. Alutto, dean of the College of Business since 1991. These factors include having the potential to accomplish personal and institutional goals, making a difference in the current position, having the opportunity to develop new skills and having fun.

This is a good institution where deans have a lot of autonomy, and that's what keeps us here," Alutto said.

But the departure of deans takes its toll. Briggs Cormier, president of the Council of Graduate Students, said a high turnover rate of deans has the potential to hurt the university because deans provide leadership, guidance and vision.

"When deans leave, the focus of the college is being disrupted," Cormier said.

Provost Ed Ray said there are major challenges in replacing deans who have left for other positions.

"A tremendous amount of effort by many individuals goes into recruiting a new dean for a college and that increases the risk that important matters are not going to be

attended to in a timely manner," Ray said. "(Searches for deans) make substantial demands on the institution while they are in process.

In Pat Mielke's article "How the Changing Job Market is Changing the Face of Staff Recruitment," Mielke said hiring qualified staff in the academic profession and getting them to stay is becoming more and more difficult. Some universities have hired full-time professional recruiters to keep up with high turn-over rates.

Chuck Knapp, managing partner of the Higher Education Practice for the personnel recruiting firm Heidrick & Struggles, said the skills deans learn at OSU make them very employable, and also very hard to replace.

"People have great experience by the time they leave OSU, including a broad range of administrative responsibilities; successfully managing budgets, fund-raising, revising curriculum, increasing research efforts and managing promotion and tenure programs," Knapp said.

Deans at OSU, especially in the colleges of medicine, business and engineering, are almost like a CEO of a company, said former Engineering Dean David B. Ashley. Not all universities give deans that kind of respon-

Moods, weather affect investors' confidence in stock market

Investing in the stock market can be a risky experience. Sunshine, moods and stock returns have a statistically reliable relationship, according to new research done by David Hirshleifer, the Kurtz chair in finance at the Fisher College of Busi-

"There is a lot of evidence from psychology that sunlight affects people's moods and also affects how people behave," Hirshleifer said. "If people are more optimistic when the sun shines, they may be more inclined to buy stocks on sunny days

Papers have been written on how sun-

shine influences markets. In 1993 E.M.J. Saunders wrote in the "American Economic Review" that when it is cloudy in New York City, the New York Stock Exchange index returns tend to be negative.

Hirshleifer started his research in 1982 with Tyler Shumway, assistant professor of finance at the University of Michigan. They wrote a paper on their research called "Good Day Sunshine: Stock returns and the Weather.

Their research found that moods affect how people evaluate stocks. When people evaluate arguments in good moods they tend to be less critical and more receptive to the arguments, even weak ones, than when they are in bad moods.

Hirshleifer and Shumway gathered

data from 26 cities around the world that had major national stock exchanges from 1982 to 1997. The weather data was collected from the International Surface Weather Observations (ISWO) sold by the National Climactic Data Center. The data contains detailed descriptions of the weather at 3,000 locations worldwide.

"What we did was from the daily level we looked at the statistical relation between stock returns in each country and the weather," Hirshleifer said.

According to the statistics, the research proved a highly reliable relationship between the two.

"When there's more cloud cover, stock returns are on average lower," he said.

When looking at all 26 countries in the

U.S. stock market this proved to be true. They found on sunny days the average return would work out to 25 percent annually, but on cloudy days the return dropped to less than 9 percent.

In their evidence Hirshleifer and Shumway found people making bad investment decisions because they are influenced by their moods. The most important recommendation when trying to evaluate a stock or what the stock market is worth, is to take a step back and evaluate ones mood at the time.

"It's been found that when you point out to people the thing in their environment that's affecting their mood, then they are able to adjust for it," Hirshleifer said. Hirshleifer advises people to be cautious if basing their investments on the weather. The research is still fairly new and critics say not just traders who live in one city influence stock prices, but investors all over the country make stock market trades.

Hirshleifer and Shumway said that they do not expect New York to be the only influence in stock prices. They did point out, however, that most of the major institutional investors and brokerages are located in New York and most of the important exchanges are made there.

Hirshleifer is working to extend this research and to understand whether seasonal variations and weather conditions might be related to seasonal moods in stock prices.

Bendapudi's love of learning creates passion for teaching

Many college students, have had the opportunity to learn from at least one special teacher who has pushed them academically and displayed a contagious enthusiasm for the subject they teach.

For many students, assistant professor Neeli Bendapudi is that special teacher.

Bendapudi was one of the recipients of the Ohio State 2000-2001 Alumni Award for Distinguished Teaching. The recipients of this annual award are nominated by students and colleagues and then are chosen by a committee comprised of students, faculty, and alumni. More than 300 faculty have received this award since it was created in 1960.

Recipients of the Distinguished Teaching Award receive \$3,000 donated from the Alumni Association and a \$1,200 increase in their base salaries. They are also inducted into Ohio State's Academy of Teaching, which strives to improve teaching at the university.

Bendapudi said receiving the award was a complete surprise and she never expected the honor at this stage in her career.

To be recognized across the university where there are so many talented professors is something beyond anything I have experienced, and it is definitely a big plus," Benapudi said. "It will always be among one of my most cherished memories, without a doubt.'

Since Bendapudi's arrival at OSU in 1996, she has taught managerial marketing and promotional strategies at the undergraduate level. She has developed and taught a services marketing course at the MBA level that Business Week magazine mentioned as one of Fisher College's most recommended cours-

She received the Pace Setters Undergraduate Teaching Award in 1998 along with AMA Marketing Professor of the Year Award that same year.

Also in 1998, she was the faculty honoree at the SPHINX and Mortar Board Senior Faculty/Staff Recognition Reception

In 2000, she received the MBA program's Outstanding Elective Professor Award from that year's class.

Bendapudi said teaching is a passion that grew out of a strong emphasis on education during her childhood in Vizag, India.

"I guess teaching is almost in my blood because both my parents are professors, and I grew up in a small university town, which I was very comfortable in that environment," Bendapudi said. "Also, the schooling I received had a heavy emphasis on education."

Bendapudi received her bachelor's and master's degrees from Andhra University in India where she took a consumer psychology course that sparked her interest in marketing.

"The professor that I had was a wonderful role model. She really encouraged me to pursue this," said Bendapudi.

Bendapudi traveled to the states to study marketing at the University of Kansas, where she earned her doctorate. She went on to teach at Texas A&M University for two years before she and her husband, Venkat were offered positions at OSU. Bendapudi said one of the reasons they accepted the positions at OSU. was due to the engaging faculty and administrative members of Fisher College.

"In the marketing department, there is a core group of us that eat lunch together each day," Bendapudi said. "Having supportive colleagues makes a

Blood drive at Schott to aid Central Ohio

Ohio State and the American Red Cross are teaming up for the third year with the "Give Some-one a Schott at Life," blood drive on Wednesday, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Schottenstein Center.

"OSU faculty and students have shown tremendous support in the past. We are hoping for another really good turn out," said Bethany Dohnal, spokeswoman for the American Red

Cross.

The American Red Cross hopes to collect 200 units of blood at the Schottenstein Center, which would count for one-third of the

region's daily collections. "The blood that we collect is distributed after being tested in a Detroit laboratory, to 27 different counties and 54 hospitals in Central Ohio," Dohnal said.

Dohnal said between Memorial Day and Labor Day blood donations decrease while the demand increases.

"Donors are less likely to give blood due to vacations and fun in the sun. At the same time, there is an increase in traumas, including boating accidents and motor vehicle crashes, which often require blood," Dohnal said.

Dohnal explained that the blood supply is very fragile.

"There is no substitute for human blood and it is perishable. Blood is only good for 42 days. It just takes one hour to help save someone's life this summer," Dohnal said.

Donors will receive a free Tshirt, register for prize drawings, and have the satisfaction of helping to save lives. Central Ohio Diabetes is also offering optional free screenings from 10 a.m. to 7

Blood donors must be at least 17-years-old, weigh at least 110 pounds, and be in general good health and bring a photo identification.

Brain glue helps patients **By Alicia Code**

With the recent approval of a type of "brain glue," treatment of Brain Arteriovenous Malformations is becoming safer and more effective.

According to the Toronto Brain Vascular Malformations Study Group, AVM's are an abnormal tangle of blood vessels with weakened walls. These vessels become engorged with blood and then can hemorrhage and bleed, damaging surrounding brain tissue.

"AVM's occur because of genetic predisposition that doesn't manifest itself till years later," said Gregory A. Christoforidis, assistant professor of interventional and diagnostic neuroradiology.

"There are three current treatments for AVM's; embolization, surgery, and radiation. Embolization is when the glue is used. The glue is similar to super glue. It is a Tiquid embolic agent called n-Butyl Cyanoacrylate and it is injected into the AVM in the brain through a catheter that is inserted in the groin.

"Usually if used in conjunction with something else, either surgery or radiation it makes it much more effective," Christoforidis said. "Studies that have been done in the past have shown that with good embolization of the AVM before surgery or radiosurgery, 10 to 40 percent of the time it will completely work to get rid of the AVM." Before the approval of the glue other types of agents were used in the embolization process.

"People were injecting particles and coils but they don't always work and are not a permanent solution. The glue actually works 'and is a permanent occluding agent," Christoforidis said.

Kronmiller will replace Henry Fields, who has served as dean for the past 10 years. Ray said Fields indicated at the beginning of the 1999/2000 academic year that he did not wish to return as dean. The university spent almost a year conducting a national search for Fields' replacement.

New program to reward Cold War defense workers By Jennifer Rudzinski Lantern staff writer Sen George V. Voinovich recently announced a new program to compensate Cold War-era defense workers for illnesses they contracted from exposure to hazardous materials. The program was launched on July 31 and the U.S. Department of Labor is evaluating applications and will begin to award funds to workers and their families.

"For decades people worked on the front line devoting their lives and they became very ill," said Scott Milburn, spokesperson for Sen. Voinovich. "The federal government pretended their illnesses didn't exist."

The law the federal compensation program is authorizing will make employees who were sickened by exposure to radiation, beryllium or silica in the workshop eligible for \$150,000 in one lump-sum and lifetime benefits relating to exposure.

Surviving spouses and dependent children of deceased employees will also be eligible for compensation.

According to the U.S. Department of Energy, workers from 35 departments, along with atomic weapons facilities in Ohio, are eligible to participate in the program.

The labor department will administer compensation and health benefits, while theenergy department will assist workers in filing state workers' compensation claims.

Ohioans working for B & T Metals and the King Avenue and West Jefferson Battelle Laboratories during certain dates when the organizations did work on nuclear weapons systems are eligible to apply for benefits.

Anyone eligible for the compensation can get applications online at the Department of Energy Worker Advocacy Program Web site at www.eh.doe.gov/advocacy or at the Labor Department's site at www.dol.gov.

back, so I'm going to go out and put it all on the table.


The microscope that Bellisari is under has grown because of an able backup in sophomore Scott McMullen, who has not changed his mind about his position on the team.

Buckeyes look foward to start of season in newly remodeled 'Shoe **By Lucas Sullivan**




Lewis: Family key to athletic success

Lewis was in Columbus on Wednesday at the Columbus Athletic Club for the first annual Carl Lewis International Track and Field Festival that took place in the Jesse Owens Memorial Stadium on Saturday.

Lewis spoke about the importance of parental involvement in their children's interests, specifically through sports. He also discussed how sports helped bring him closer to his family and also helped with his education.

He began his speech talking about the hardships of growing up as the youngest and smallest in a familt of three accomplished athletes. Because of his size, no one ever thought he would accomplish as much as his older siblings.

Lewis smiled and said his mother always gave him the encouragement he needed by telling him she knew he would be great one day.

"I always tell my mother, 'Gosh I don't know how to describe you. You were either the greatest motivator or the sweetest little white liar who lived," Lewis said.

Lewis then spoke of his parents' vision for their childrens' futures. Lewis said his parents, who lived in Montgomery, Ala. during the civil rights movement, were inspired by Rosa Parks.

"My parents used to say, 'Do what you think is right. Always do what you think is right. Follow the rules that are afforded to you 100 percent. Get your education," Lewis said.

"Our families stayed together. They were involved in sports, we were involved in sports. We used to travel together," Lewis said. "They were able to constantly instill values and report all the values that they thought were important to us and still are.'

Lewis, whose parents were both teachers, spoke about his parents involvement with his academics. Unlike most kids in his neighborhood, Lewis was allowed to play after

As sports proved a way to keep the Lewis family close, it was also a catalyst for Lewis' interest in studying.

After his father told him about Jesse Owens, Lewis began to research his career. Owens' experience in the 1936 Olympics in Berlin, Germany sparked Lewis' interest in history

Lewis also said that since his retirement in 1997, he has been searching for a way to give back to track and field.

"The values I thought were needed to keep the sport going were not being addressed," Lewis said. "In the last year, track and field has really gone through some difficult times and I feel it's a lack of support by youth and family.

Lewis said the festival was designed to bring adults and their children together by providing events for all age groups and other events, like the 5K run or walk, where everyone can participate together. He also said the festival was going to honor academics as well as athletics

Lewis said he chose Columbus because of its historical value and the inauguration of the Jesse Owens Memorial Stadium.

Anthony Brown, athletic director at Linden McKinley High School in Columbus, was looking forward to the festival and to the opening of the new track

"It was a shame and selfish on Ohio State's part to drop the stadium and eliminate the track that Jesse ran on," Brown said. "However, I can see, in some way, they made it up by building this track.'

Brown said children love sports, but sometimes influences can interfere with parental involvement. He said things are getting better and hopes Lewis' message will encourage parents to become more involved with their children.


Kevin Smith doesn't aim to entertain with "Jay and Silent Bob Strike Back" so much as reward his fans for their loyalty.

If you're one of them, you can sit smugly in the audience, knowing that you're laughing because you're in on the joke. You're a movie geek you rule, dude.

To achieve this cinematic nirvana, you need to have seen all of Smith's earlier movies — "Clerks," "Mallrats," "Chasing Amy" and "Dogma" — and know specific details about them. You also need to be familiar with — if not a devout fan of — the other movies and TV shows Smith deems important, including "American Pie," "Scream" and "Dawson's Creek."

Being a comic book geek isn't an absolute necessity, but it helps.

As writer, director and co-star, Smith offers a road movie that goes nowhere, a script that's merely a laundry list of pop-culture phenomena - not that the members of his cultlike following care. A few spo-radic moments are good for a laugh, but you've got to slog through a sea of fart jokes and graphic descriptions of nasty sex acts to get to them.

Paper work' not mundane for artists

A celebration of paper and of art is on display at the Riffe Gallery downtown until Oct. 7. Paper Routes 2000, an art show organized by the Southern Ohio Museum in collaboration with the Ohio Arts Council, demonstrates usage of paper as a medium for a wide range of visual art disciplines as used by Ohio Arts Council Individual Artist Fellowship recipients.

This exhibit showcases the talent and creativity of 13 featured Ohio artists. Their work is diverse, challenging and nothing short of captivating, with forms ranging from a paper jacket and dress to computer generated images.

Sarah Johnson, curator for the Southern Ohio Museum, reviewed thousands of slides of artwork from Ohio artists for the show. The result of her work is a stunning assortment of works on paper that encompass several different disciplines, including collage, drawing, photography and printmaking.

George Mauersberger, a professor of drawing at Cleveland State University, has five of his

works on display in the Paper Routes 2000 show

"My works are derived from an image of me," Mauersberger said. "When I do a series of drawings, I have an idea I explore over the group of drawings.'

His works, displayed in the Riffe Gallery, explore the concept of altered self-portraits With paintings entitled "Curly," "Vis" and "Spot," Mauersberger's work clearly delves into the inner-self and the nature of human expression

Experimenting with a completely different form of artwork on paper, Todd DeVriese creates collages centering around the shape of an obelisk.

"The obelisk is a culturally specific historical architectural form," DeVriese said. "It is about history lost and recovered.'

DeVriese, an assistant professor of art at OSU, uses the resources of magazines, books and encyclopedias for the collage background of his works. These images explore the history of humankind from all different civilizations, shadowed behind the looming obelisk. His works are full of color and represent a celebra-

tion of history.

Hanging boldly in gigantic metal frames, the 3-dimentional works of George Kozmon do not fail to fascinate the viewer. These gigantic 4-by-7 foot paintings are a mixed reminder and foreshadowing of civilizations that have come and gone

"Architecture is a metaphor for civilizations," Kozmon said. "It engages in an idea of realism and abstraction. These works are somewhat romantic and dark and remind us of the transient nature of civilizations and cultures."

An advocate for art as a medium of communication, Kozmon believes that his pieces may have for each viewer a different meaning, story and background.

More than 50 works are shown at the Paper Routes 2000 exhibit. With works ranging in shape, size and color, the viewer will easily find himself absorbed in this show. The artwork from these 13 Ohio artists is thought provoking and visually enticing. Each piece stands out as individually captivating, but together they blend smoothly into the theme of artwork on paper.

Admission to Paper Routes 2000 is free.

concerns move Latin Grammys to Safety

MIAMI — The Latin Grammy Awards will be moved from Miami to Los Angeles because of fears Cuban exile protesters will threaten the safety of performers and attendees.

"I can't guarantee the security of our people. We have people coming from all over the world," said Michael Greene, president and CEO of the National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences and the Latin Recording Academy. "Having to run that gauntlet is demeaning at best and dangerous at worst."

The ceremony will be Sept. 11 at the Great Western Forum in Los Angeles.

Miami city officials agreed Sunday to let protesters demonstrate in a three-block area near the AmericanAirlines Arena, but academy officials wanted protesters to be kept farther away.

Greene cited protests held in 1999 when the Cuban group Los Van Van performed in Miami. Batteries and eggs were thrown at ticket holders as they arrived, he said.

Miami-Dade County Mayor Alex Penelas offered Monday to create a half-block buffer between the protesters and a security zone established for performers and attendees arriving at the arena, but the offer was not enough.

Greene said academy officials considered moving the event north of the city to Broward County but Florida Highway Patrol and sheriff's deputies told them they could not guarantee attendees' safety.

About 60 exile groups opposed to Fidel Castro planned to protest against Cuban musicians and artists attending the ceremony. The groups would have gathered across from the AmericanAirlines Arena at the Freedom Tower, a former immigration processing center that Cuban Americans call their Statue of Liberty.

Penelas said the event would have brought \$30 million to \$35 million in revenue to the area.

Last year, Miami's civic leaders rejected a request to host the show. They cited a law barring the county from doing business with those who have dealings with Cuba. The show was held in Los Angeles instead.

But this year, a coalition led by Miami-Dade County Mayor Alex Penelas courted the awards show after the law was struck down.

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STATE Death row prisoner will not 'go quietly'

COLUMBUS — An attorney pleaded for the life yes-terday of a man who says he will choose electrocution if he is executed next month for stabbing a store clerk to death during a robbery.

John Byrd Jr., who says an accomplice committed the slaying, wants to make his execution as difficult as possible for state authorities, public defenders say.

"He's not going to go quietly into the night," David Bodiker, Ohio public defender, said yesterday.

Byrd, 37, is scheduled to be executed Sept. 12 in what would be the state's first electrocution in 38 years. In Ohio, inmates may choose between injection and the electric chair.

Byrd denies killing Monte Tewksbury, a suburban Cincinnati convenience store clerk, in 1983. His attorneys acknowledge he was an accomplice in the robbery.

Yesterday they asked the Ohio Parole Board to recommend that Gov. Bob Taft change Byrd's sentence to life in prison. Last week they asked a state appeals court to order a court hearing on Byrd's claim that one of two accomplices killed the clerk.

Richard Vickers, an assistant state public defender, told the parole board that he took a statement in 1989 in which the accomplice, John Brewer, admitted to the stabbing. Vickers said he made a mistake in not releasing the execution will give the family justice.

statement years ago. He said he intended the document to be used during the clemency process, not for the ongoing appeals. It was a legal strategy he now regrets

"I made a mistake, but it was not because I didn't think Brewer was credible," Vickers said. "It was a decision I made. It was wrong, but blame me, don't blame John Byrd.

Hamilton County Prosecutor Michael Allen called Brewer's testimony "absolutely and patently absurd." Prosecutors have said Brewer changed his initial story

of not being involved to save Byrd from execution.

Brewer was convicted as an accomplice and could not legally be tried again, prosecutors say. He was sentenced to life in prison.

Byrd's mother, Mary Ray, 53, and his sister, Kim Hamer, 33, asked the board to spare his life.

"I plead, I beg — my body, my mind, my soul — please don't let them execute my baby, please," Ray said.

Tewksbury's widow, Sharon Tewksbury, 57, called Byrd a coward and asked the board to allow the execution to proceed. Her husband, who was 40 when he died, had been moonlighting at the convenience store from his regular job at Procter & Gamble Co. to earn extra money for his daughter's education.

When Byrd murdered her husband, she said, "He invaded our world, our peaceful existence and began for us a nightmare that has not ended."

Tewksbury's daughter Kimberly, 37, said allowing the

"John Byrd has had 18 years to beg for his pathetic life," she said. "My dad had maybe 18 minutes."

The board will make its recommendation to Taft on Friday. The governor can grant a pardon, reduce Byrd's sentence or allow the execution to proceed. The clemency hearing was the first one open to the

media since Ohio reinstated the death penalty in 1981.

Ohio prisons Director Reginald Wilkinson and Parole Board Chairwoman Margarette Ghee decided to open the hearing because of wide interest in the case.

Clemency hearings for Jay D. Scott, executed on June 14, and Wilford Berry, put to death in 1999, were closed to the media.

The board recommended against clemency in both cases

Byrd came within hours of execution in 1994 before the U.S. Supreme Court stepped in to allow his appeals to proceed.

Wilkinson last month urged the state to retire the electric chair because malfunctions could be too stressful for prison staff members.

Ohio's 105-year-old electric chair hasn't been used since 1963. Wilkinson said the chair has been rewired and is expected to operate properly, but there is less potential for problems with lethal injections.

Toledo mayor intimidation case **By John Seewer**

TOLEDO — A restaurant owner who accused the city's mayor of threats and intimidation dropped his criminal case as the trial was to begin yesterday.

John Skiadas, owner of Pepe's Mexican Restaurant & Cantina. said he had no confidence in the special prosecutor the city's law department appointed to handle the case.

"We feel we've been set up to lose this case," said Skiadas' wife, Georgette.

Carty Finkbeiner, a Democrat first elected as mayor in 1994, had been accused of threatening to take official action against Skiadas in July 2000 because of delays in opening the restaurant in the cityowned Erie Street Market, where vendors sell specialty foods and crafts.

"From day one, he didn't have a case," Finkbeiner said.

Finkbeiner was accused of grabbing and shaking Skiadas while yelling obscenities in his face. Skiadas said at the time he was trau-

matized by the confrontation and checked into a hospital with cardiac problems.

Charges of disorderly conduct and interfering with civil rights were dismissed earlier in the case.

Finkbeiner pleaded innocent to a charge of coercion, which carries a maximum sentence of 90 days in jail and a \$750 fine.

The mayor said he used strong words in his meeting with Skiadas but didn't do anything wrong. Finkbeiner said he went to the restaurant because Skiadas was six weeks behind on rent, had thrown city inspectors out of the building and was late in its open-

ing. The city had given Skiadas \$100,000 in loans and grants for the restaurant.

"He did get a lecture and he did deserve a lecture from me," Finkbeiner said Monday. Skiadas said the prosecutor, for-

mer Ottawa County Prosecutor Lowell Peterson; had met with him only once and had not interviewed any witnesses Sam Kaplan, the mayor's attor-

ney, said all indications were that

Peterson was prepared for the trial. Skiadas said he also has been in bad health and wasn't able to with-

stand the stress of a trial. He said he will continue with a civil lawsuit filed against the mayor. Peterson, who announced that the charge was dropped, left Toledo Municipal Court without comment-

Finkbeiner is blocked from running for re-election this year because of term limits.

The case is one of three in which the mayor was accused of hitting someone.

Police say one of the other accusations was a lie. In the second case, Carolyn Smithers, a former city employee who ran the Erie Street Market, accused Finkbeiner of striking her with a coffee mug.

She sued, and the city settled the case for \$35,000. Finkbeiner admitted no wrongdoing in the settlement.

The mayor has said that allegations against him have been motivated by people seeking revenge, publicity and money. He said Smithers was upset because he fired her as manager of the market.

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NATIONAL New York police officer apologizes

Gray: 'I'm not the mindless drunk

portrayed on television'

NEW YORK — The police officer charged with killing three family members while driving drunk apologized yesterday and declared he is "not the monster" portrayed in the media

Officer Joseph Gray's news conference was disrupted by a community activist who bitterly denounced him and held up a sign saying: "Jail, No Bail for Drunk Killer Cop."

"I'm not the mindless drunk being portrayed on television," said Gray, who faces criminal and departmental charges, including manslaughter and vehicular manslaughter. He was freed on \$250,000 bail earlier this month.

Gray was indicted in the Aug. 4 deaths of 24-year-old Maria Herrera, her 4-year-old son, Andy, and 16-year-old sister, Dilcia Pena, Herrera was eight months pregnant; her baby boy was delivered stillborn.

Because of the ongoing investigation, reporters were not allowed to ask Gray what happened that day and whether he has a drinking problem.

The officer said the idea to call the news conference was his.

Gray, who had previously apologized through his lawyer, expressed his regret to the victims' families. Gray looked downcast throughout the brief news conference. His wife, Diana, and his lawyer sat on either side of him.

"I think it's important that I express my sincerest condolences on behalf of myself and my family to the Pena and Herrera families," he said.

He also said, "I just want people to know that I'm not the monster that people think I am.'

"I just think it's important that people see who I am," Gray said. "I'm home every day to take care of my children," he added, referring to his 5-, 11- and 16-year-old daughters. "I have a daughter who was in preschool up until June. I was home every day to take her to school, pick her up, take my wife to work

Gray has been suspended without pay for 30 days, and is awaiting a departmental trial.

The news conference was disrupted toward the end by David Galarza, who described himself as

a friend of the Herrera and Pena families.

"I came here out of justice. He should be in jail!" he shouted. You're not a police officer, you're a murderer!"

After the outburst, Gray's attorney, Harold Levy, ended the news conference as Gray remained seated before a bank of microphones. His wife tried to comfort him as

they left.

Gray had allegedly been drinking for up to 12 hours before the accident. A police investigation revealed that he and other officers drank beer in an NYPD parking lot, then moved on to a strip club declared off-limits to officers from Gray's 72nd Precinct in Brooklyn. Seventeen officers were disci-

plined. Three who were on proba-

tion were fired; 14 others were either transferred, suspended without pay or placed on desk duty without their guns and badges

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Asked about substance abuse problems in the NYPD, Gray said, "I think it's bigger than the department wants to acknowledge.

Department officials had no immediate comment.

New Jersey rabbi faces death penalty By Brendan Schurr

CAMDEN, N.J. — Jury selec-tion began yesterday in the case of a rabbi accused of plotting the 1994 slaying of his wife, who was found beaten to death on the couple's living-room floor.

Rabbi Fred J. Neulander sat in the courtroom as the first 100 potential jurors were called from an expected pool of 1,200. Jury selection was expected to take weeks.

If convicted of murder and conspiracy, Neulander, 60, could become the first New Jersey clergyman to receive a death sentence.

Authorities claim Neulander arranged to have his 52-year-old wife, Carol, killed so he could continue his affair with Elaine Soncini, a Philadelphia radio talk-show host

Prosecutors said Neulander told Soncini that a divorce would threaten his position at Congregation M'Kor Shalom, the synagogue the Neulanders founded in Cherry Hill, a wealthy suburb of Philadelphia.

Leonard Jenoff, 54, a private investigator, has confessed to beating Carol Neulander to death. Jenoff said the rabbi promised to pay him \$30,000 to do it — a claim Neulander denies.

Jenoff and his former roommate, Paul Daniels, 27, have pleaded guilty to aggravated manslaughter and are expected to testify at the trial

Neulander resigned as senior rabbi in February 1995 amid reports that he had been unfaithful. His attorney, Jeffrey Zucker, said last week that his client is anxious to "get the matter behind him.'

Twelve jurors and four alternates must be selected, but a large pool of potential jurors is being called because of publicity sur-rounding the case and to screen for potential bias.

The potential jurors must fill out a 174-item questionnaire asking if they've ever had a negative experience with a Jew and whether an adulterous man is more likely to commit a crime against his wife.

Opening statements are expected to begin Oct. 15.

Bush wants \$39 billion for military, benefits for vets Bush outside the Midwest Express Center. et and a chrome helmet. To help shore up funding for Social Secu-**By Christopher Newton** Associated Press writer

MILWAUKEE — President Bush said yesterday he will insist that Congress approve the additional money for the military that he has asked and he promised that the struggling health benefits system for veterans will soon be restructured.

"All I ask Congress to provide is an increased \$39 billion for the military," Bush told cheering delegates to a convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. "This is the largest increase in military spending since Ronald Reagan was the commander in chief."

Bush also pledged that the system of benefits for veterans would be revised soon, accusing past administrations of letting veterans' claims linger for years.

'That is no way to treat America's veterans and that is going to change," Bush said. Dozens of protesters whose causes ranged

from abortion to the environment waited for

Inside, he was applauded several times by the thousands of veterans, although some were not totally satisfied with his speech.

"I wished he had talked more about Social Security," said Robert Wilkinson of Gulf Port, Mo., a veteran of the Korean and Vietnam wars. "He makes promises to the veterans and they're the same promises we've heard for the last 10 years.

After the speech, Bush visited a Harley-Davidson plant across town. His motorcade was greeted by seven orange-and-black Harley-Davidson 18-wheel transports circled like wagons around dozens of gleaming motorcycles.

He walked through the plant signing Tshirts, jeans, arms, old Texas Rangers tickets and a hat.

"The Harley-Davidson is uniquely American," Bush said. "Some people are bold enough to ride them. Some people aren't.' Company executives gave him a leather jack-

The company that makes the Harley-Davidson has been immune to the economic troubles dealt most other motor vehicle manufacturers. Harley stock prices have risen 23 percent this year.

Bush flew to Milwaukee from his sunbaked central Texas ranch, talking here yesterday and in Missouri today about his plans for pulling the economy out of a slump and redesigning Social Security.

"It's somewhat sly, but it looks like Bush is doing some early campaigning for 2004," said James Tyson-Shelding, a political ana-lyst in Fort Worth, Texas. "He's heading to states that he probably feels he should have won or almost lost ... places where there is a substantial Republican population but his message didn't take root.

Bush's staff closely guarded what his spe-cific messages will be, but the administration has been moving forward on plans for both Social Security and Medicare.

rity, the president has proposed letting younger workers invest some of their payroll taxes in the stock market. He recently created a commission to devise a plan, recommend how to pay for it and report to him in the fall.

The social program is expected to face shortfalls when the baby-boom generation starts retiring in the coming decade and fewer workers pay into the system.

Bush is also expected to talk about an expected budget surplus. On Wednesday, the White House Office of Budget Management is expected to release figures on how much money is left over. Political analysts say Bush is clearly on

the campaign trail.

"It's a two-birds-with-one-stone situation," said Patrick Delraj, a political science professor at the University of California. "He's laying groundwork to be in a stronger position next time around."

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
