Dukakis triumphs in Penn. primary

PHILADELPHIA — Michael Dukakis trounced Jesse Jackson in the Pennsylvania primary Tuesday night, gaining a landslide that certified his status as Democratic presidential front-runner. George Bush won a resounding Republican victory and predicted the state would deliver the final delegates needed to clinch the nomination.

Dukakis was gaining 75 percent of the vote with 13 percent of the precincts counted, and Jackson was winning 18 percent. CBS reported on the basis of interviews with the voters that the Massachusetts governor would win by a margin of roughly 2-1.

Bush was gaining 79 percent to 11 percent for dropout Sen. Bob Dole and 9 percent for former television evangelist Pat Robertson.

The vice president campaigned across Ohio during the day, declaring, "We're almost getting

down to the main event. According to the AP this evening, I'll capture enough delegates in the Pennsylvania primary to exceed the 1,139 convention delegates needed for the nomination."

The Associated Press delegate survey indicated by winning most of the delegates at stake, Bush would make his nomination a mathematical certainty.

Dukakis sought a large majority of the 178 Democratic National Convention delegates at stake in a drive to pad his lead over Jackson. Delegate tallies lagged hours behind the popular vote.

Delegates were all that mattered in the Republican race, where Bush long ago routed his rivals to seize command over the race for the nomination.

The outline of Bush's campaign against Dukakis has begun taking shape. The vice president said the Democratic front-runner lacks foreign policy experience and added, "That will be a major issue

in the fall."

The vice president also arranged to meet Wednesday with President Reagan. Spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said Reagan "will see him first thing in the morning, and I am sure the president will offer his congratulations and discuss how he can help in the campaign."

The network polling-place interviews contained news that was as good for Dukakis as his vote totals, even though Jackson gained more than 90 percent support from blacks.

ABC polling analyst Doug Muzzio said for the first time in the campaign season, Dukakis was winning a majority of voters who cited the poor and elderly as their chief concerns. Jackson had always won these voters in prior contests. He said Dukakis also was winning voters who cited strong leadership and ability to make a change, groups Jackson usually won in earlier races.

U.S. policy debated

The United States is primarily interested in controlling resources and protecting its own investments in Latin America, said Noam Chomsky, a political activist and professor of linguistics at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Chomsky debated U.S. foreign policy with Richard Perle, assistant secretary of defense from 1980-1987, at Independence Hall Tuesday night.

Some of Chomsky's statements aroused cries of boo from a few of the 700 people who attended the debate, and about 40 people left during his speech.

Chomsky said the United States has backed many governments and organizations in Latin America, such as the Contras, which "butcher and assassinate" in order to stay in control.

He said the U.S. government has always feared any cries for

democracy from Latin American people, and specifically the Sandinista revolution, because the liberal ideas exhibited by these revolts are a threat to U.S. investments.

"Now that's unacceptable, because the United States is committed to encouraging a climate conducive to private investments," he said.

Chomsky cited what he said were secret State Department and CIA documents, saying that the United States had plans after World War II to control the Third World.

"The Third World was to fulfill its function as a source of raw materials and markets for the industrial capitalist powers, and was to be exploited," he said.

He said America would use force, if necessary, and "vague and idealistic slogans" as tools for control.

Perle disagreed with Chomsky, and said the United States backs only democracy in Latin America.

He said the United States has had no plans to control the Third World and has in fact been behind reforms in many countries.

"Where do you see signs of control in relation to our principle allies?" Perle asked.

Court's decision critical

Rights at risk officials say

Monday's 5-4 decision by the U.S. Supreme Court to review a ruling that has since provided precedence in civil rights cases could be dangerous if overturned, said Ohio State officials from the offices of Minority Affairs and Affirmative Action.

The justices have decided to review the validity of a 1976 ruling that enables people with allegations of discrimination to seek damages from private citizens, employers and schools.

"As a person who cares about civil rights, it's disturbing to me," said Albert L. Clovis, associate dean and professor at the Ohio State College of Law.

Usually the court decides whether it will review a case on the basis of the issues that a party presents to the court. Elliot

Fishman, case officer and attorney for the Office of Affirmative Action, said that in this instance, the justices reached out on an issue not presented to the court and decided to review the case on their own initiative.

The case in question, Runyon vs. McCrary, evolved when a black student was refused admission in a all-white private school in Virginia.

The Supreme Court ruled 7-2 that schools denying individuals the right to make and enforce contracts on the basis of race were in violation of the Civil Rights Act of 1966.

Clovis said he was not certain whether the case would be overturned, but he said he was concerned about the potential outcome.

"Why would they do it if they don't plan to overturn it?" he said. "It raises the question 'is the newly comprised majority as committed to protecting civil rights as it has been?'"

"If they pass a ruling to overturn it, it would cut down on

an opportunity to get relief from the federal courts," Clovis said.

Fishman said the Supreme Court has made a dangerous mistake.

"It will set a precedent for the court to look at other cases that were not raised," he said. "It can set back civil rights considerably."

Frank W. Hale Jr., special assistant to the president and vice provost for minority affairs, said the judges' decision to hear the case was a poor one.

"I think that's just backing down to the nineteenth century, even the thought of reviewing the case," he said.

Hale said he blames the Reagan administration and a lack of affirmative action leadership for the justices' recent action.

"It should be no surprise to us," he said. "Reagan appointed conservatives and they are reacting to the things they perceive he wants."

OSU Republicans protest during debate

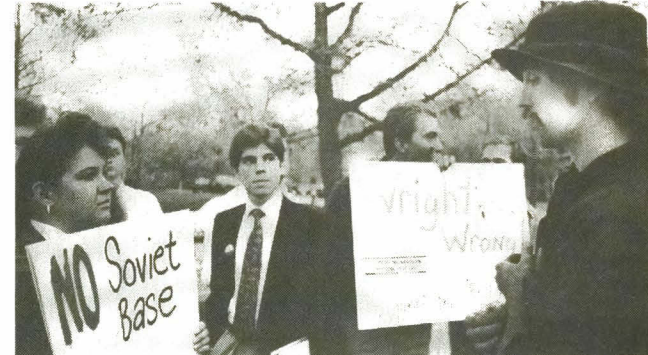

Students from the OSU College Republican Club, who were passing out pamphlets protesting Daniel Ortega, were asked to leave by security officials who said the crowd was "bordering on disorderly."

Several protesters said they want the United States to support the Contras because the Sandinistas are not allowing freedom in Nicaragua.

Wisconsin students not flocking to buy Floyd tickets

While many OSU students are wishing they had access to more Pink Floyd concert tickets, students at the University of Wisconsin do not seem to care as much about the group's upcoming concert.

Pink Floyd will appear at Camp Randall Stadium May 20, eight days before the band's scheduled show at Ohio Stadium. Of the 52,000 tickets available for the Wisconsin concert,

only 35,000 have been sold, said Jeff Frank, of Frank Productions, promoters of the show.

All 62,000 tickets for the OSU date are sold.

University of Wisconsin officials' decision to host a concert at Camp Randall echoes OSU administrators' feelings.

"It was a question of finding the right group and the right time," said Michael Goldman, director of the Wisconsin Union Theater.

The concert will be sponsored by the

union theater and the university athletic department, Goldman said.

"Our office has been working on bringing a concert to Camp Randall for the last five years," he said. "This is the first group that was appropriate."

"Pink Floyd was chosen because they attract an older crowd as well as college students," Goldman said.

He said the university tried to sign Bruce Springsteen but plans fell through.

Goldman said because there was no pre-sale for students, tickets were sold

through local ticket outlets and by phone. Although students did not have to stand in line for color-coded wristbands before purchasing tickets, students did camp out at local ticket outlets, but the crowd was very organized, Goldman said.

The Wisconsin campus-area population is about 350,000. There are about 43,000 students on campus this year, Goldman said.

Pink Floyd sold out at Milwaukee last fall, which is 90 miles away from campus, he said.

Todd Vanderbilt, a University of Wisconsin student and reporter for the school's newspaper, said Pink Floyd's recent appearance could explain why the concert has not sold out yet.

"We are not a huge popular market for a show of this size," Vanderbilt said.

Spring Quarter ends at Wisconsin one week prior to the Pink Floyd concert, but Goldman said many students are staying for Summer Quarter.

Panamanians plan military coup

WASHINGTON — A group of Panamanian dissidents is planning to undertake a military operation against strongman Manuel Antonio Noriega by the beginning of next week, an opposition leader said Monday.

Ambassador Juan B. Sosa, who has maintained his loyalty to ousted President Eric Arturo Delvalle, told reporters the group is made up of very knowledgeable officers who have many friends in the Panamanian Defense Forces, or PDF.

Sosa gave no details, but the group apparently comprises high-ranking defectors from the Defense Forces who came to the United States shortly after Panama's crisis erupted two months ago with Delvalle's ouster.

One is Air Force Lt. Col. Augusto Villalaz, who has been living in exile in Washington for the past five weeks. He claimed that he and other Defense Force pilots flew more than 90,000 pounds of weapons from Cuba to Panama before he defected.

Sosa, who has refused to relinquish the embassy to a replacement envoy appointed by the new government in Panama, said the dissident group has set up a "military command" and has "intimate knowledge" of the Defense Forces.

Compromise reached on guns

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration and law enforcement groups agreed Tuesday on compromise legislation to ban undetectable plastic handguns, using an approach that has been staunchly opposed by the National Rifle Association and its legislative supporters.

Joseph A. Morris, director of the Justice Department's Office of Liaison, said the proposed legislation would be sent to Congress this week.

The compromise represents a change in position for Attorney General Edwin Meese III, who earlier endorsed the NRA approach. Meese now believes the compromise language is more enforceable, Morris said.

The approach to dealing with plastic guns — which are not yet being manufactured — has generated the latest raging debate between the NRA and handgun control groups.

Gun control groups, joined by police organizations, have been lobbying for a bill that would require a minimum standard of metal in any gun, so the weapon would trigger an alarm in today's metal detectors.

French party divided by rightist

PARIS — The stunning performance of extreme rightist Jean-Marie Le Pen in the presidential election's first round indicates a major split among French conservatives that could put them in the minority for years.

The National Front leader surpassed all predictions Sunday, winning 14.4 percent of the vote. He nearly matched the 16.5 percent gained by former center-right Premier Raymond Barre and was not far behind conservative Premier Jacques Chirac, who had 19.5 percent.

Sunday's winner, with 34.1 percent of the vote, was President Francois Mitterrand, a 71-year-old Socialist who built a moderate image in the waning years of his first seven-year term. Chirac, 55, will face him in a run-off May 8, and attracting Le Pen's supporters appears to be the premier's only chance.

"The right, which is in the majority today in France, risks being in the minority in two weeks," said Pascal Perinot of the Center for French Political Studies. "Chirac is caught between two blocs demanding different things."

OSU rape study to be explored

The fear of being raped affects all women.

It affects where they live, where they work, when they take classes and when they walk alone.

The Ohio Coalition on Sexual Assault (OCOSA) will hold its eighth annual meeting to address issues of rape education and prevention April 28 at the YWCA, 65 S. Fourth St.

"Through education, rape does not seem inevitable," said Kirsten Isgro, OCOSA project coordinator.

In the keynote address, Mary Margaret Fonow, assistant director of OSU's Center for Women's Studies, will present the results of her study on attitudes toward rape among OSU students.

Fonow collaborated on the study, which was published in

January, with Laurel Richardson, OSU professor of sociology.

"College men hold more myths about rape than women," Fonow said. "That is, if women dress a certain way, drink in bars, or go

According to FBI statistics, one out of every three women will be raped in her lifetime and more than 60 percent of all rapes are committed by someone the woman knows. Every two and one-half

State Sen. Michael R. White, D-Cleveland, will speak at the meeting about proposed legislation that would impose stricter penalties on convicted rapists and allow rape victims or their families to be notified of parole hearings.

Senate Bill 347, introduced in January, would require an automatic prison sentence for convicted rapists, instead of possible suspended sentences.

The bill would also require individuals 16 years and older who are indicted on charges of rape or felonious sexual assault to be tried as adults, said Cheryl Davis, White's legislative aide.

The conference begins at 9 a.m. and ends at 3 p.m. Registration costs \$5 for OCOSA members, \$8 for non-members, and includes lunch. For further information, contact OCOSA at 469-0011.

Fonow's research surveyed 582 students between the ages of 18 and 24. Results showed students who had been exposed to rape education and prevention through workshops held fewer myths about rape. Of those surveyed, 55 percent were male, Fonow said.

Scientists test mirror for future telescope

TUCSON, Ariz. — Engineers Tuesday lifted a giant oven lid to check a mirror that astronomers hope will lead to the next generation of super telescopes, and the huge piece of cooling glass was pronounced "just fine."

"I don't know how nervous you are, but I'm certainly feeling it," Peter Strittmatter, director of the University of Arizona's Steward Observatory, said Monday after engineers began spin-casting glass into what they hope will become a honeycombed 11-foot mirror, the largest ever to be made in that manner.

Colleague Roger Angel is credited with the idea that he and other Steward astronomers hoped would bear fruit.

The first 24 hours, during which the mirror actually is molded, are the most critical, Strittmatter said Monday. He said scientists lifted the lid to get a view of a "red-hot product."

Strittmatter said the mirror apparently formed without any problems but that engineers and astronomers will have to wait the six weeks until they know for certain whether the mirror was successfully produced.

"So far, so good," Angel said. "The trick is to get it from this

temperature (about 1470 degrees Fahrenheit) down to room temperature in one piece."

ARC is a joint project of five universities — the University of Chicago, Princeton, New Mexico State, University of Washington and Washington State.

USG ELECTION: A laugh a minute

Every year USG asks: "Why doesn't the student body vote — why doesn't anyone take us seriously?"

And every year the group holds a laughable election with proceedings more resemblant of a circus than an official governmental election.

Ohio State must have the only system in the world where a candidate can be sanctioned for putting a poster in the wrong place and has a system for tabulating votes that takes weeks.

Five of the eight presidential teams had charges filed against them and had to be reviewed. Scott Hunter, director of the Student Election Committee, said now that the violations hearings have been completed, the committee can begin verifying and tabulating votes.

Hunter added he hopes to send the approved ballots to University Systems sometime this week to be counted.

Sometime this week. Two weeks after the students voted. The United States of America can vote for and find out the president of the country in one night. There must be a way to speed up the process for electing and announcing the president of the student government.

USG purports to be an important, if not the most important, representative body of Ohio State's undergraduate students. That surely should be true. But year after year the officials of USG are left scratching their heads trying to figure out why the group gets no respect and why credibility is lacking.

Anytime you can find a reason to laugh at something, that something immediately falls down the ladder of respect.

A USG election that is less of a joke might not get as many laughs.

SET BACK: Civil rights regress

What next? segregated restrooms and drinking fountains?

In its Monday ruling the U.S. Supreme Court warped us back in time with its decision to consider throwing out a key civil rights decision used to fight discrimination.

The decision in question is a 1976 ruling that expanded the right of minorities to sue over alleged discrimination.

In a 5-4 vote the justices broadened the scope of a North Carolina racial-harassment case to consider limiting the ability of minorities and minority groups to sue private citizens and private organizations for monetary damages.

With racial tension at a high in the United States the highest court of the land has added insult to injury by considering restricting the fight against discrimination.

What are minorities to do when our own government has decided to argue that fighting bigotry must be limited to the public arena?

Sometimes monetary damages are the only thing that make some people listen. Suing a person or a organization may not change the offending party's views about minorities, but it is certainly a deterrent to discrimination.

Additionally, President Reagan's stance on Supreme Court judges is that they should not be activists who seek out cases to judge. In Reagan's view, the Supreme Court should only decide cases brought to it.

In this instance, Reagan's view is accurate, particularly in light of the ultimate power of the Supreme Court as proven by the possible ramifications of the court's consideration of throwing out the key civil rights decision.

Think about it. If the Supreme Court throws out a progressive civil right decision, this country will be set back at least 10 years.

You'd better be, this space wasn't easy to get.

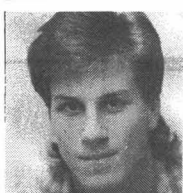
I had to convince my editors to give the fraternities and sororities on the Ohio State campus a little extra attention during their one week of the school year — creatively titled "Greek Week."

Non-college youth get closer look Foundation studies alternative options

For young people with the academic and financial resources, the after-high school path has been reduced to a routine: Get into the best college your grades and finances can afford, and then, perhaps after a graduate degree, start the climb up the career ladder.

For the others, the path is a good deal rockier: Find a job—usually a job with no career ladder—and try to survive until you are old enough for an employer to take you seriously.

Virtually all our official attention has gone to the first group. The education-reform movement of the past several years has taken for granted that everybody is (or ought to be) going on to college.

The William T. Grant Foundation is urging a harder, more sympathetic look at "the forgotten half"—the 20 million youngsters aged 16 to 24 who won't be going to college.

THE FOUNDATION, in the interim report of its Commission on Work, Family and Citizenship, 1988, does not discount the importance of college education. But it does argue that we need to do far more, academically and vocationally, for our non-college-bound young people.

And the first thing we should do, it says, is to stop thinking of these youngsters as predominately drug-

abusing, crime-prone and irresponsible. Some are; most aren't.

"While many youth without college education are successful, the commission is concerned that a large fraction of them are finding it harder than ever to swim against an economic tide that is flowing against them. They are seeking jobs they cannot find. Their work, often on a part-time basis, earns too little to support themselves or a family. They are floundering in their efforts to find a place for themselves. And some are losing hope that they have much of a future."

The remedy routinely offered by all except the vocational-education professionals is: college.

But as the report notes, many youngsters who are capable of earning a decent living are not college material, and they will become less so to the extent that the schools implement

the tougher standards everybody seems to be urging.

SO WHAT should we do for "the forgotten half"? Strengthen the schools, of course, particularly by providing alternate, hands-on, learning experiences and job preparation for young people who do not fit the college-bound mold. But:

"Students may work hard through the 12 grades of school, may compile adequate records and may graduate in good standing, and their teachers may have effectively taught them the basic skills. Nevertheless, they are still likely to encounter problems in getting started in a productive career. The primary problem lies with the economy, and the paths for youth to enter it, rather than with the youth themselves."

The commission argues for:

—A BETTER first chance": more career-oriented opportunities with better pay and more chances, in school and out, for skills enhancement. "The half of our youth who do not go on to college have a right to be able to compete for jobs that are adequate in numbers, that offer reasonable wage levels, that provide health insurance and other essential benefits, that offer career advancement in return for

diligence and competence, and that provide continuing educational opportunities and Retraining benefits if they are displaced by technological change";

—INCREASED ALTERNATIVES to traditional schooling, including an expanded Job Corps as well as state and local job-training programs;

—GREATER ACCESS to the "lifelong learning" programs that already are working well for adults with some college but that "have largely bypassed the unemployed and underemployed blue-collar workers, who most need the added training."

The commission does not underestimate the value of college training indeed it argues for a better educated citizenry to meet the political, cultural and technological requirements of the society. But its emphasis, in this interim report, is on "the forgotten half."

"Our economy, national security and social cohesion face a precarious future if our nation fails to develop now the comprehensive policies and programs needed to help all youth."

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Talk turns to running mates, supporters rally

PHILADELPHIA — George Bush's spokesman suggests that there is "something really unseemly" about efforts to promote this or that person as the ideal vice presidential candidate.

Democrat Michael Dukakis is even more blunt. "The nominee makes that decision," he says.

But the people who are promoting various running mates as the only real hope for the Republican or Democratic ticket in the fall are not easily discouraged.

To begin with, they tend to be people who thought neither Bush nor Dukakis had a chance of

surviving the primary season. Depending on their place on the political spectrum, they spent much of the past year dreaming that Mario Cuomo or Edward M. Kennedy, Pat Buchanan or Jeane Kirkpatrick would bring some excitement to the presidential race.

THE PENNSYLVANIA primary on Tuesday should give Bush the 1,139 delegates he needs to claim

a majority at the Republican National Convention next August in New Orleans.

That same primary should give Dukakis a fourth straight primary victory and convince most of the remaining doubters that the Massachusetts governor will be the candidate chosen in Atlanta in July.

But the skeptics still doubt either man can win in November without considerable help from a carefully chosen running mate.

Dukakis has a perceived problem of geography.

Not since 1976, when Georgian

Jimmy Carter was at the top of the ticket, has a Democratic presidential candidate carried the South.

TO BOLSTER his Southern strength, Dukakis is being urged to choose from a small group of Southern senators — Sam Nunn of Georgia, Lloyd Bentsen of Texas or Bob Graham of Florida.

In obvious contrast to the Democrats, the Republicans have been looking unbeatable in the South and West in recent presidential elections.

The party's conservative wing

wants a signal from Bush that he is a loyal conservative who won't ditch the Reagan agenda if he becomes president. What they now view as the clearest signal would be the choice of one of their own as his running mate.

Few people set conservative hearts aflutter like Jeane Kirkpatrick, the hardline former U.N. ambassador. So now comes Curt Clinkscales, a conservative activist, who has formed an unauthorized committee to draft Mrs. Kirkpatrick for the GOP ticket — an effort the former ambassador disavowed through a spokesman.

"She believes the decision on the vice president should be solely that of Vice President Bush," said Mark Salter.

Nor was it encouraged by Peter Teeley, spokesman for Bush.

"THESE EFFORTS are sometimes embarrassing to the people that they're allegedly designed to help," he said. "There's just something really unseemly about trying to force somebody onto a ticket... to throw them forward in an effort they haven't sanctioned themselves."

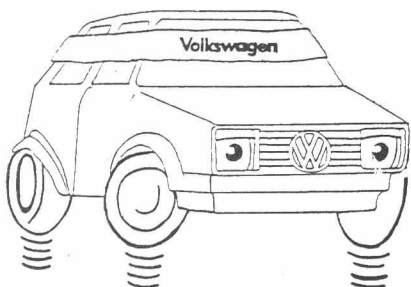
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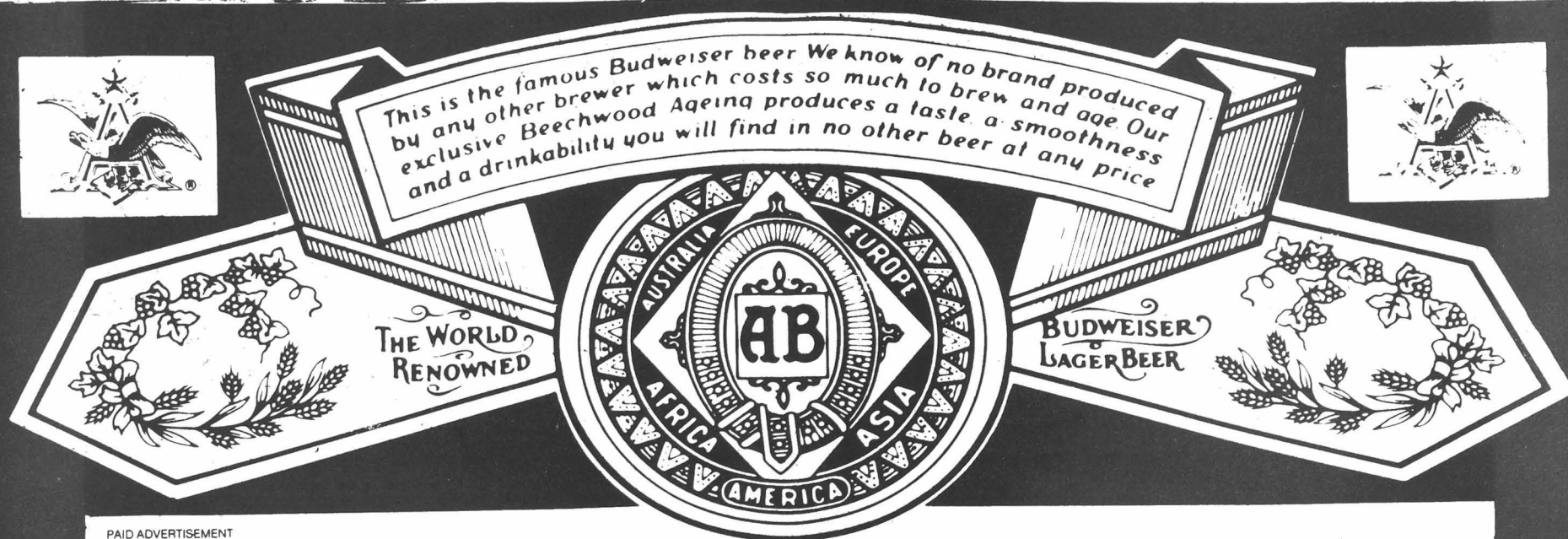
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5,000 METER ROAD RACE

Ohio State looks to clip Falcons

Yes, OSU baseball players do put their pants on one leg at a time.

The Buckeyes (23-19 overall, 10-6 in the Big Ten) played like mortals this weekend, splitting a four-game series with Indiana (29-13, 5-11). Ohio State had won 11 of their last 13 games.

Coach Bob Todd said he didn't think splitting four games with Indiana would damage the Buckeyes chances to make the conference tournament.

"Our players really showed a tremendous amount of character in the way they competed," Todd said. "A split on the road might be as well as what you can expect."

Second baseman Scott Meadows said, "I don't think you could call it a setback. Sure, we would have

liked to win three out of four, but they got a couple real good pitching performances. That's just competition in the Big Ten."

Ohio State has dropped into a third place tie with Wisconsin, behind Michigan and Michigan State. Todd said the Buckeyes are in the best possible shape, though, because they can determine where they finish in the conference. Ohio State will play Michigan and Michigan State during the last two weekends of the regular season.

"We're not looking back over our shoulder at anybody," Todd said. "If we just take care of our own business, then we'll be in the tournament."

Ohio State will travel to Bowling Green University today to play a single non-conference game. Falcon Coach Ed Platzer said his team could be in for some trouble

if the Buckeyes throw one of their top pitchers.

"I hope we don't see a Schwarber or a McCormick because we'll definitely be in for some trouble," Platzer said. "We'll have to claw and scratch to score runs."

Todd said he wasn't sure which pitchers he would use against the Falcons, who are batting .289 and averaging five runs per game.

Platzer also said he was concerned his pitching would not be able to handle the Buckeye offense. He said he would be forced to throw one of his younger pitchers against the Buckeyes, who continue to lead the Big Ten in batting average (.342), runs scored (118), hits (162) and RBI (107).

The Buckeyes will resume their Big Ten schedule with double-headers April 30 and May 1 against Northwestern.

Spielman's mom proud of Chris - and Rick

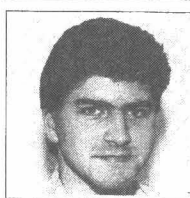
Nancy Spielman never knew the NFL draft was going to be so difficult to watch last Sunday. Mrs. Spielman, awaiting news of which professional football team would draft her youngest son, Chris, couldn't stand the tension in the Spielman's television room of their Massillon home. She sought refuge in the kitchen and anxiously waited for news.

"When I heard them all scream Detroit, I immediately thought, 'oh, no, not the Lions,'" Mrs. Spielman recalled.

Her initial unhappiness had nothing to do with the Lions' 1987 record, a dismal 4-11. You see, Mrs. Spielman now has two sons on the Lions, and the irony doesn't end there. Her oldest son, Rick, just happens to play the same position as Chris - inside linebacker.

"I was very unhappy at first," she remembered. "But the first thing I heard Chris say when he got the call from Detroit was, 'oh, this is so great, I'm on Rick's team.'"

The Spielman brothers never had the fraternal problem of competing to see who was best. In fact, their mother insists they

were each other's biggest fan.

"When Rick had tough times recently, (he was cut by the San Diego Chargers last year) the first person he called was Chris," she said. "And whenever Chris was feeling down, his brother got the first call."

Rick, a 1987 graduate of Southern Illinois, signed with the Lions in March. Chris, a two-time All-American, finished his career with Ohio State last season.

The younger Spielman had 156 tackles during his senior year as a Buckeye. He finished college as the second leading tackler in Ohio State history after starting the final 38 games of his career at inside linebacker.

In a family of such talented brothers, there could easily be jealous feelings when one brother

plays better than the other. But when college recruiters billed Chris as the best high school player in America in 1984, Mrs. Spielman didn't worry about Rick getting less publicity. She knew her oldest son just had something to shoot for.

"I've never seen any jealousy between those two in my life," the proud mom said. "When one of them does great at something, the other just has a reason to try harder and top it."

Mrs. Spielman and Sonny Spielman, her husband, have always tried to support each of them equally. When both Chris and Rick were in college, they alternated Saturday trips between Columbus and Carbondale, Ill. Now, they welcome the chance to see both of them in the Pontiac Silverdome, home of the Lions.

"I didn't realize at first how close they would be playing next year," she said. "All of our friends in Massillon told me we'll have a caravan of cars and buses to go see them next fall."

Mrs. Spielman isn't concerned that both sons will be working for the same spot on the Lions' roster in training camp.

"I've always told them that they were both blessed with great talent," she said. "Now, if they want something like a spot on the roster, they just have to go out and get it."

The possible scenario awaiting Mrs. Spielman this fall is not one that many mothers would envy having to face. One of her sons could start for Detroit while the other would have to play the back-up role to a brother. Yet, she prefers not to worry about that possibility and thinks both sons will get playing time with Detroit.

"I wouldn't say I'm nervous about all of that," she said. "I think I'm just excited for both of them. Once one of them gets on the field, I'll just concentrate on how he's doing out there."

"My sons have been dreaming about a chance to play in the NFL since they were little boys," she said. "Now their dream has come true and I don't think I've come down to earth yet."

With two sons playing on the same professional football team, Mrs. Spielman couldn't be prouder - of Rick or Chris.

If enthusiasm and Texas scouting reports mean anything, the Ohio State men's basketball team has landed an exceptional recruit — Jamaal Brown.

Brown, a 6-foot-4, 190-pound guard from Arlington, was ranked by many Texas scouting reports as the number one guard in the state, said Don Lewis, Brown's coach at Sam Houston High School.

"I've been head coach here for 16 years and he's the best basketball player ever to come out of here," Lewis said.

Brown is expected to officially sign a letter of intent to play at Ohio State at 5 p.m. today. And

he is anxious to play the fast-paced game for Coach Gary Williams in the physically demanding Big Ten.

"I'd describe my style of play as run and gun, but I like playing the physical game also," Brown said. He said the strongest part of his game is driving to the basket, but still needs more work on his jump shot. He hopes to contribute significantly his first year.

"AS A freshman, I'm going to help the team wherever I am needed," Brown said. "By my sophomore year, I expect to win a starting position."

Lewis said Brown's goals are feasible.

"We've had all of our success over the past two years when the

ball was in Brown's hands most of the time," Lewis said. "He is a great talent, but more than that, he has excellent work habits, and he uses his talent."

Lewis said Brown is a versatile player who can play the point- or off-guard position equally well. As a senior, Brown averaged 23 points and nine rebounds a game.

Brown's father, Otis, said the recruiting talents of the entire OSU staff, especially those of assistant coach Fran Fraschilla, is the main reason Brown chose Ohio State.

"FRAN FRASCHILLA showed great interest in Jamaal as a player and a person," said Otis Brown. "They always called to see how Jamaal was doing, and that

coupled with a visit by Williams and a good campus visit clinched it."

Brown, who graduates June 1, had narrowed his choice to Ohio State and Auburn University, and admitted the visit to the campus swayed him to the Buckeyes.

"I met all the guys on the team, and I got along with them all really well," Brown said. "I liked the big city atmosphere and the educational opportunities that Ohio State had to offer."

"A lot of other schools had similar opportunities, but Ohio State offered the whole package," he said.

Another factor both Brown and his father liked was Williams' coaching style.

"COACH WILLIAMS coaches like I play — with intensity," Brown said.

Both father and son agree the decision to travel so far to play and learn is the right choice.

"After looking around, I feel I am going where it's best for me," Brown said.

Otis Brown said, "I think going to school so far away will make Jamaal a more responsible person. I told Jamaal that his first priority is school and his second is basketball."

Williams and his staff can not comment on Brown until he is officially signed with Ohio State.

The Buckeyes then scored two

more runs in the fifth to make the final score 4-1.

Ohio State's coach Barb Dearing was happy with her teams overall performance.

"I'm glad that we hit the ball a little better than we have been," she said. "I'm real pleased that Amy Smothers was able to get her homerun."

The second game of the doubleheader saw tough defense from both the Buckeyes and the Vikings.

There was no score until the third inning when the Buckeyes scored on a bunt single, two stolen bases, a walk and two singles.

Cleveland State held the Buckeyes again until the fifth inning when Shauna Bowman hit a triple that would bounce off the fence at center field. Bowman would then score on a single by Sue Gahn to make the score 2-0.

The Buckeyes added two more runs in the sixth.

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Celeste signs student bill, adds two trustees to board

Gov. Richard F. Celeste signed House Bill 34 Tuesday, which adds two non-voting members to the Board of Trustees.

The bill, which will become a law in 90 days, will allow students to become more involved in the Board of Trustees' activities, Celeste said.

Thirty-eight other states and the District of Columbia already have student trustees, Celeste said.

Rep. Mike Stinziano, D-Columbus, sponsor of the bill, said, "This is a red-letter day for higher education in the state of Ohio."

"It's been a testimony of the persistence and commitment of literally thousands of people over the last decade and a half."

Stinziano, who introduced the student trustee bill in the Ohio House in 1973, said he does not expect any change in Ohio law that requires board members to be Ohio residents.

"I believe the legislature feels strongly that Ohioans ought to be making decisions for Ohioans on university boards of trustees," he said.

Stinziano also said Ohio State

will seek an opinion from Attorney General Anthony J. Celebrezze concerning the 1953 law that says board members may not be employed by the state or the university.

"There are different ways to interpret the law. The intent of the language is not at all clear," Stinziano said. "If the opinion of the Attorney General indicates that a change in the law is necessary to allow students who also happen to be employed in the cafeteria, in the bookstore, or as teaching assistants, in the case of graduate students, obviously we will move to change the law."

"A change of this nature would be considered 'housekeeping,'" Stinziano said. "I expect that this would be facilitated before the legislature adjourns this year."

Members of the Ohio Student Association were in attendance as the governor signed the bill including student leaders from Ohio State, Miami University, Youngstown State and Ohio University.

Wendy Johnson, president of the Ohio Student Association, said many students were involved over the 16-year span in getting the bill passed.

"Just this year we had an incredible effort down at the Statehouse to get the bill passed."

We've had students from every state university come down at one time or another and worked on the bill," she said.

Johnson said students will bring a unique perspective to the Board of Trustees.

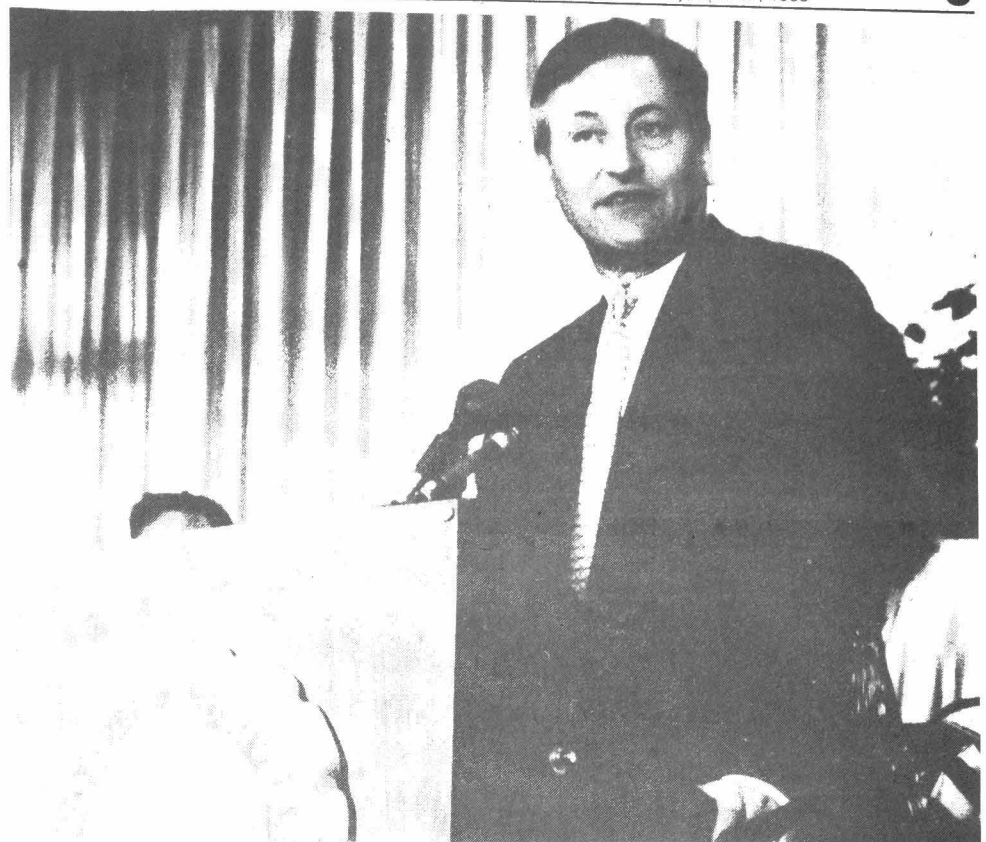
"We deal with day-to-day activities on our campuses that sometimes the trustees find it easy to overlook," Johnson said. "We deal with the day-to-day problems of racism, drugs and alcohol abuse. The trustees need the students' perspective."

Johnson said, however, most students are opposed to the amendment to the bill that prohibits students from being voting members of the Board of Trustees.

"Rather than sacrifice the whole bill, we get students on the board, without voting rights," she said.

Johnson also said that student members will not be allowed in executive sessions.

"There are certain things they want to keep us out of, such as personnel decisions, litigation and real estate," she said. "For some things, I understand that, but keeping us out of executive sessions gives the board a big cushion. They can talk about things the students won't find out about."

Ohio State has enough cadavers

Although the University of Illinois has not been able to find an adequate number of cadavers for its medical schools, Ohio State does not have that problem.

Dr. James S. King, chairman for the Department of Anatomy in the College of Medicine, said Ohio State has not had a problem getting the 100 cadavers instructors need each year for their dental, nursing and medical students.

Martha Sweeney, laboratory coordinator for the University of Illinois, said the class for first-year medical students at the

university needed 20 bodies this year but only received 10. She said they hope to have 12 next year for the class.

Sweeney said the Illinois medical schools get their cadavers from the Anatomical Gift Association, the state source for cadavers. The bodies are donated to the association, she said.

"The bodies they have are being divided among the schools," Sweeney said. "We can't go to another state to get bodies because of laws with interstate dealings."

The bodies are never bought, but donated by individuals, King said.

"Without these individuals' willingness to do this, health

education would be severely hampered," King said. "All these professions are required to know about the human body."

The cadavers are used for laboratory teaching of students, to give them "hands on" knowledge of the human body, King said.

After the medical students are finished with the bodies, they are cremated at no cost to the family.

Jeanne Odum, who runs the Ohio State body donation program, said the program does not advertise to get people to donate their bodies.

"People write or call and then we send them an information brochure and some forms to fill out to donate their body," she

said. If the individual signs the donor form, they receive an acknowledgment letter and a donor card.

Odum said more individuals are interested now than in the past and they seem to be younger. "I don't know how they find out about it," she said. "I think they hear about it through word of mouth."

"The people donate because they feel they are still contributing in some way after they are dead," Odum said. "Some people really feel like they are helping someone, and they are, because we couldn't teach without these donations."

High Street progress cause for celebration

Sweet dream turns sour

Once upon a time, there was an artist whose dream came true when she had her first solo exhibition.

She worked hard to hang her show. The opening was a magical event. The artist was pleased.

In time, her pleasure turned to horror as she observed in disbelief that some of her art works vanished. The gates to the gallery were closed when she wanted to enter them.

The artist fairy tale had turned into a nightmare. Her dreams were shattered but she became a wiser artist because of her experience.

Deborah Seaberg, a fine arts major from Brookville, had her first one woman exhibition in March at Doo-Wac Barber Salon, 1355 N. High St.

Seaberg gave me a call. We met to talk about her experiences in the real art world. She hoped that what she learned could be passed on to others.

"I went into the gallery to check everything," Seaberg said. "I noticed my object art on the floor was gone and off the floor. The window piece was totally dismantled, the broom was gone and the dirt was swept away."

"I felt like I was treated with a lot of disrespect, in an unprofes-

sional manner which I didn't deserve," Seaberg said.

"I was willing to show, so I was willing to go along with no contract. But from now on I will get a contract, a signed agreement."

After I talked to Seaberg, I contacted Brad Sutton, the owner of Doo-Wac. The work in the window was "my dirt and my broom; should have been called my piece," Sutton said. "The blanket (art object removed from floor) didn't make any sense."

"A lot of times I use new people who have never shown before. I liked Deborah's paintings, but we had a lack of communication."

"It's important to work with the artist, much like a director and actor. With communication, working with the gallery people can inspire, as with Wayne Karl (artist currently exhibiting at Doo-Wac)."

"I usually work with the artist," Sutton said. But unfortunately he didn't have the time to spend

with Seaberg.

I was confused from my conversations with Seaburg and Sutton. I understood both their points of view. Neither one was wrong, neither was right. As is the way of the world, too little time for communication caused confusion and misunderstanding.

I phoned Carla Peterson, coordinator of curatorial programs for the University Gallery of Fine Art. She explained to me the professional manner in which works of art were handled by their galleries.

Though most galleries are run like a business, it is the casual relationship that is good for the artist. It allows both the gallery owner and artist to make a contribution to the exhibit which is beneficial to both.

Artists, know your rights.

Get everything in writing, for your protection and that of the gallery.

Make sure you understand the gallery's rules for displaying your work.

Find out if the gallery has insurance to cover any damage or theft that might occur to your work.

Find out and get in writing a commission agreement with the gallery.

If you act like a professional you will be treated like one. Make sure your fairy tale dream does not become a nightmare.

Sammy and Rosie take on the issues

More is falling in London than bridges these days.

Subjects in "Sammy and Rosie Get Laid," set in modern day London, range from lesbian relationships and social stratification to the usual catalog of politics.

Not your standard fare for an afternoon at the movies.

However, screenwriter Hanif Kureishi handles these issues in such a sensitive manner, even the most prudish theater-goer will be captivated by the clever script.

Kureishi, nominated for an Academy Award in 1987 for best original screenplay in "My Beautiful Laundrette," again shows an amazing penchant for representing the views of the youth in England.

A racial incident sparks riots as thousands take to the streets to show opposition to the authority.

Amid fire bombing and brick tossing, Rafi Rahman (Shashi Kapoor) comes into the troubled neighborhoods looking for his son Sammy (Ayub Khan Din), an accountant, and daughter-in-law Rosie (Frances Barber).

Rafi is a wealthy Pakistani politician with a shady past who is hoping to make up for lost time with Sammy. He's amazed at the state of England, and at the peculiar behavior exhibited by his son and the politically active Rosie.

Stephen Frears, who directed "My Beautiful Laundrette" and more recently "Prick Up Your

Ears," shows an incredible knack for placing his characters in the perfect locations.

However, the characters and plot aren't the essential factors for the success of "Sammy and Rosie Get Laid."

The movie is a look at a society burdened with many small problems that lead to the confused and sometimes violent state.

It's a welcome change of pace, after sitting through a dozen or so cliché-ridden affairs, to have a movie make you think.

The interesting characters interwoven through the story only make things better.

Look for Roland Gift, the lead singer of "The Fine Young Cannibals," as he makes his acting debut as Danny. His personality and political beliefs have a soothing effect on the main characters.

Sammy sums things up best when he tells Rafi the background of the current events.

"We're not from England," he says. "We're Londoners."

Ah, so true, in the melting pot of a society, transplanted foreigners are learning to cope with new ideas in a country rich in tradition.

Enlighten your life

"The Unbearable Lightness of Being" is not a film you see — it's a film you feel.

It's an erotic epic, a film which successfully merges sex, politics, love and war.

The emotions in this film are strong. As a viewer you experience the passion in the sex, the outrage of the politics, the depth of the characters' love and the horror of war.

Set in Prague, "The Unbearable Lightness of Being" tells the story of a young dashing brain surgeon named Tomas (Daniel Day-Lewis) who is as deft in bed as he is with a scalpel, and with as many lovers as patients.

Tomas likes to keep his relationships "light" and therefore refuses to spend the night with any woman after love-making, lest he develop any emotional attachment.

Sabina (Lena Olin) is Tomas' longtime lover, who like Tomas, prefers sex without a commitment. Tomas tells her "Life is so light — like an outline we can't ever fill-in or make better. I always try hard not to get too attached to a place, objects or people."

While performing an operation at a small town outside Prague, Tomas meets Tereza (Juliette Binoche), a young waitress, who immediately falls under Tomas' erotic spell, and follows him back to Prague.

There Tomas breaks his own commandment and allows Tereza to move in with him, and eventually marries her on a lark. While Tereza marries the young surgeon for love, Tomas considers her a sexual convenience.

He continues to rendezvous occasionally with Sabina, and

has a hard time understanding why his new wife cannot view his relationships with the same light attitude as himself. Tereza's jealousy is intriguing to Tomas, but it does nothing to produce fidelity.

As Tereza struggles to reconcile her love for Tomas with his indifferent attitude, the Russian invasion of August 1968 happens, temporarily distracting the disillusioned young wife.

The frustration of the Czech people toward the military might of Russia becomes a resigned complacency, and Tomas decides to accept a long-offered surgical position in Geneva where Sabina had moved at the beginning of the Russian invasion.

Tomas resumes his sexual relationship with Sabina in Geneva, and a fed up, confused Tereza returns to Prague.

Tomas returns home, feeling some obligation to his wife, but not understanding what she wants most is his faithfulness.

Philip Kaufman's direction of the film is very artistic, capturing the attitude of the 1984 book by Czechoslovakian exile Milan Kundera. Kaufman ("The Right Stuff") never apologizes for the nature of the film, and shouldn't, because it is a three-hour masterpiece of emotion.

If you leave the theater without feeling the pain of infidelity, the arousal of love-making, and the earnest nature of Tomas' search for an unburdensome love, you have missed the beauty of the picture.

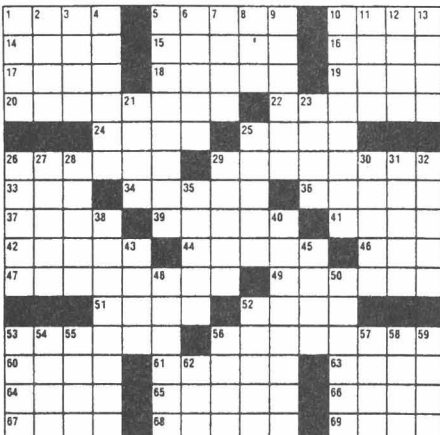

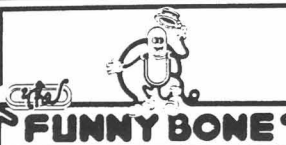

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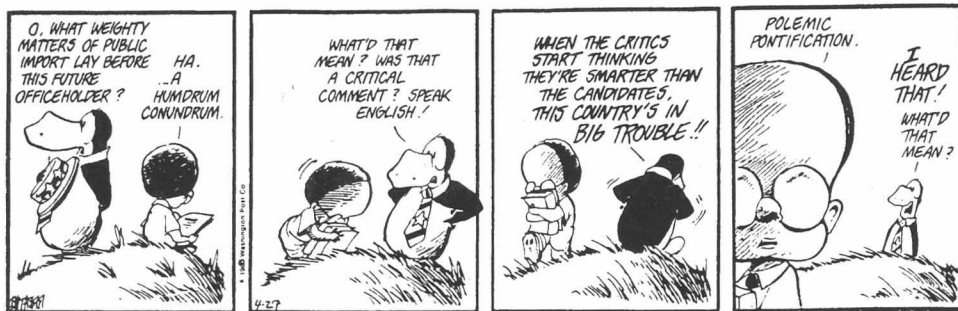

Child with AIDS gets wish, attends class for first time

LAKEWOOD, Colo. — A 5-year-old boy has accomplished his dream of attending school before he dies of AIDS. He began his first day of preschool by telling his classmates about his fatal disease and his "bad blood."

The boy, whose breathing is aided by an oxygen tank, surprised his mother by volunteering the information as his seven classmates introduced themselves, his mother said Monday.

"He said 'This is my oxygen, and I have a disease. My bad blood could kill you,'" said the mother, Shiela, who took her son Jonathan on Monday to the special education class at Patterson Elementary School.

"He didn't wait for anything. And the kids responded really well," the mother said at a news conference outside her condominium in this Denver suburb.

"He broke the ice right off and from then on it was just normal kid stuff," said Shiela, a divorced mother of three other sons.

She has asked that her last name not be published because she fears retaliation against her family.

"They listened and they played with me," Jonathan said of the hour he spent in the classroom.

Asked whether his first day was as much fun as he expected, he replied, "Yeah."

Shiela said her son's biggest dream has been to attend school before he dies.

"He used to talk about dying all the time and he said he wanted to die," she said as Jonathan watched ants inching along the sidewalk. "But he hasn't addressed it since he found out he would get to go to school. He hasn't mentioned it in the last couple of weeks."

As his mother talked with reporters, Jonathan showed off a Polaroid picture of himself at school. At one point, he walked away to play on the sidewalk, unhooking the tube that connected him with the oxygen tank.

Jonathan's hopes of going to school were blocked several times in the past year by one delay after another. Earlier this month, a tutor assigned by the school district to teach him at home demanded to be reassigned, threatening to file a lawsuit if forced to continue the tutoring. The request was granted.

School officials decided April 19 to allow Jonathan to attend class.

Jonathan is Colorado's first recorded child victim of the fatal disease, said his mother. The youngster contracted AIDS from tainted blood he received in a

transfusion shortly after birth and was diagnosed in June 1985.

"One thing that sticks in my mind, he used to say 'Jesus doesn't listen to me. ... I told Him to come and get me, and He didn't.' It really rips your heart out, but I think in a way he's comforting me by telling me it's all right with him. He was diagnosed three years ago, and it's just a matter of time."

Pam Mills, executive director of exceptional students' services for Jefferson County Schools, also attended the news conference and said she was unaware of any parents who had kept their children at home because of Jonathan. There were no protesters or parents outside the school Monday.

Mills said parents of the other students had prepared their children. "We have met with the parents a couple of times," she said. "It's basically a health and hygiene type of issue with them."

Jonathan eventually will attend class 10 hours a week and his progress will be evaluated in May and in August.

Shiela also plans to enroll Jonathan in summer classes. "He has such a limited time in school."
