Man arrested for hit-and-runs

Five vehicles, two patrol cars hit in multiple accidents on High Street

A series of hit-and-run accidents along North High Street ended when the driver of a navy blue Chevy pick-up was apprehended by Columbus police near the intersection of West Norwich Avenue.

The driver, identified as Gregory B. Temple, smashed several cars at three locations on High Street at about 10:30 a.m. He hit two vans in the parking lot and one van parked along the street at North Central Mental Health Services, located at 1301 N. High St., said Susan Jennings, a spokeswoman for North Central.

He then continued north on High Street, where he hit a pair of cars stopped at a red light and nearly struck two construction workers at 11th Avenue and High Street.

While stopped at a red light, Temple smashed one car in front of him pushing it forward about 100 feet, before he backed into another car stopped behind him.

Joe Guzzo, the site's foreman, said two of his workers were almost hit as Temple drove onto the dirt construction area where the men were working, attempting to get around the cars stopped at the light.

After driving along the dirt path, which runs parallel with the road, Temple re-emerged onto the street and sped north.

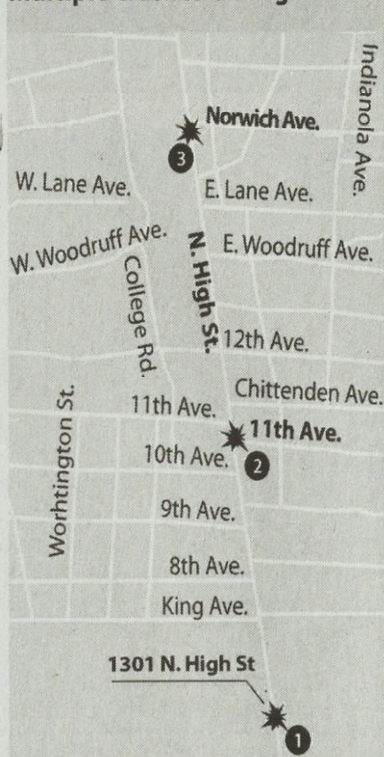
Two southbound police cars eventually pinned his Chevy pick-up perpendicular against the sidewalk in the northbound lane.

Temple was apprehended outside Waterbeds 'n' Stuff where a group of policemen appeared from their dented squad cars with guns drawn and were forced to Mace Temple because he resisted arrest.

"He finally stopped, and they pulled their guns on him," said Ashley Sumpter, 26, who saw the incident while working at Studio Posh. "Five or six cops pounced on him, and I think his head hit the

The smile on the Brutus Buckeye watching over Buckeye Donuts may be pointed downward these days. George Barouxis, owner of the campus area donut shop, a traditional late night hang-out, died last week while on vacation in Greece with his family.

Buckeye Donuts was opened in 1969 by Barouxis' father, Jim Barouxis, and George Sauter. Jim Barouxis retired in the mid '70s and George Barouxis took over his share. Another Buckeye Donuts was opened at 1363 S. High Street in 1984 by George Sauter and his son Louis, current owner of the South High Buckeye Donuts.

The North High Street Buckeye Donuts was co-owned until 1995, when the two decided to end their partnership. George Barouxis then became the complete owner of the North High

Buckeye Donuts, Louis Sauter said.

Frank Piccirillo, a Buckeye Donuts regular for seven years, said he last talked to George Barouxis while he was helping him fix up properties right before he left.

"I like George a lot. George always seemed to have a soft spot for me."

"I went to the hardware store and he said, 'If you need anything, charge it to my account,'" Piccirillo said. "Just say the donut guy — he'll take care of you."

Piccirillo said George Barouxis was always generous with him.

"I like George a lot," he said. "George always

seemed to have a soft spot for me. He'd bum a cigarette and give a whole pack in return."

George Barouxis was also generous with Ohio State organizations.

"Him and my dad always did a lot to donate to the student run programs at Ohio State," Louis Sauter said. "We'd

Donors can help Save a Life

The Red Cross national Save a Life Tour 2003 is coming to town with a mission.

According to the Red Cross, the tour is "designed to boost public education of the nation's low blood supply and encourage eligible individuals to donate blood regularly."

It has worked its way across the country and will make two stops in central Ohio. The tour culminates in November in Washington, D.C.

"We invite regular donors as well as those wanting to donate for the first time to support this national campaign," said Catherine West, spokeswoman for the Central Ohio Blood Services Region of the American Red Cross.

The central Ohio leg of the tour will kick-off at the Schottenstein Center on Monday. Participants can give blood from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. The Mobile Museum, an interactive museum that demonstrates how blood is used and why people are needed to donate, will be open to the public from 12 to 6 p.m.

West said this location was chosen because "we usually have a great turnout at OSU and collect a lot of blood there. The faculty, staff and students are very supportive."

The tour's two convoys will be at Carriage Place on Bethel Road on Wednesday and will take donations from 1 to 7 p.m. The Mobile Museum can be viewed from 2 to 7 p.m.

In an effort to encourage widespread participation, there will be a drawing held every hour in which

donors can win a variety of OSU items, such as championship football memorabilia, men's hockey and women's basketball tickets, keychains and hats.

"This is also a great way for students to help their community at no cost to them," West said. "Most students can't afford to give money to charitable organizations, but they can save a life by giving an hour of their time and one unit of blood."

Also, anyone who attends has the option to tape a brief public service message which discusses the importance of donors and how blood products are used to save lives. These messages will then be shown throughout the local tour.

The only requirements are that donors be at least 17 years old, weigh at least 110 pounds and be in general good health.

Although walk-ins are accepted, appointments are encouraged in order to minimize wait time. To schedule an appointment for either location, call 1-800-GIVE-LIFE or visit the Central Ohio Region's Web site at www.BloodSavesLives.org.

Only five percent of eligible donors give blood, which has created a deficiency. The goal of the Save a Life Tour is to collect three million blood donations from the 345 communities it will visit across the nation during the six month campaign.

"The public underestimates the need for blood and overestimates the number of donors. Many people self-defer because of medical conditions, such as high blood pressure

or diabetes, but in fact, many can still give blood as long as their disease is under control," West said.

The Red Cross Web site says, "as a result of the growth and aging of the American population and with medical advances requiring more blood for advanced cancer treatments, surgeries and traumas, the current demand for blood products is growing at a much greater rate than the supply."

Every two seconds, someone in this country needs a blood transfusion. Every day, 38,000 units of blood are needed in the United States alone.

Sen. Steve Stivers, R-Columbus, said he understands the importance of donating and will be on hand at the Shottenstein kickoff to give blood.

"It is important that we all do our part to help others, and that includes giving blood," he said. "Everyone has to keep in mind that, one day, something may happen to them and they may need blood. They will appreciate all who have donated."

Stivers also emphasized the critical need for donations.

"For some blood types, there is less than a five day supply available," he said. "If anything catastrophic were to happen, we would be in serious trouble."

West also stressed the importance of those who have been personally affected by the blood donations of others. She said the biggest problem the Red Cross faces is educating the public about the importance of blood donations.

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Computer worm invades OSU

Windows users beware — a new worm has struck the campus area.

Anyone running Windows XP, NT or 2000 is susceptible to the W32 Blaster Worm, which attacks a vulnerable part of these programs and infiltrates computers without owner's knowledge.

This worm gives a message that "System Shutdown initiated" and a restart is imminent because the Remote Procedure Call service terminated unexpectedly, according to the OIT Web site.

The infected computer will then continue to shut down and turn back on continually.

A patch is available through Ohio State's Office of Information Technology website to prevent or kill this worm.

The patch can be downloaded at <http://support.microsoft.com/?bid=823980>. If the computer doesn't stay on long enough to download the patch, it can be burnt on a CD or a floppy disk.

After the patch is in place, download and run the removal tool at <http://securityresponse.symantec.com/avcenter/venc/data/w32.blast.er.worm.removal.tool.html>. This will scan the computer for the worm, according to OIT.

Page Hall

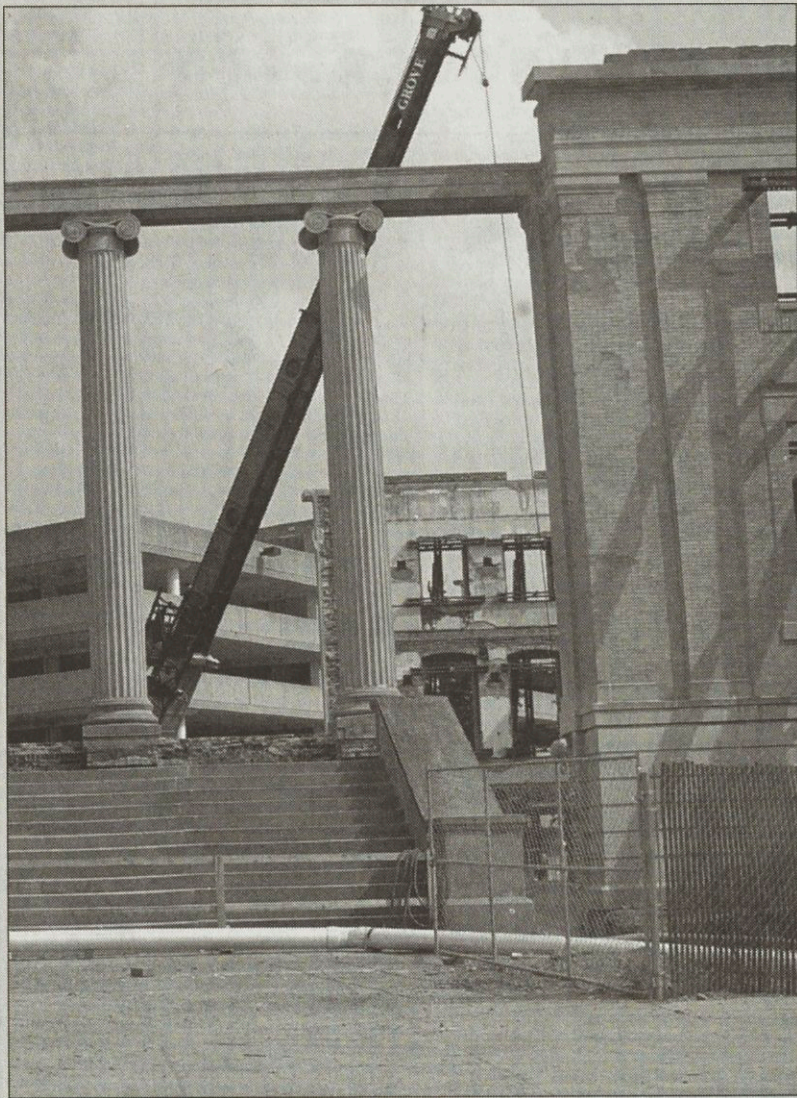
The old will soon become new for one Ohio State building, now in the process of coming back to life.

Page Hall was built in 1903 to house the OSU Law School, which it did until 1959 when the new law school was built. The building is being renovated, and it will soon house the John Glenn Institute.

The building is named after Henry Folsom Page, an Ohio attorney, who, with no ties to the university, bequeathed his entire fortune to OSU. No one knows why. Coinciding with the building's completion, the last of numerous legal proceedings involving the university and Page's family about the dispersion of his estate ended, and OSU was granted the \$200,000 of Page's donation. In honor of this charitable act, the new law school building was officially named "Page Hall," though many students wanted it to be named "Hunter Hall," after the law school dean at the time.

Page Hall was the ninth building constructed at OSU, and it cost about \$100,000 to build. It has held offices for numerous entities including: The State Health Department, the old College of Commerce and Journalism and the College of Music. The Fisher College of Business occupied the building from 1960 until 1998 when it moved to its new location.

All that remains of the classical architecture are the exterior walls, four robust columns and a grand front porch. Though the building is gutted and soon will be the setting of something com-

pletely novel to its grounds, Page Hall is a souvenir of a time when OSU was only pursuing greatness.

In its halls and rooms, many students gained knowledge of the curriculum and of OSU itself. The building, original in design,

defines campus in a way no other can. Once a magnificent structure, now partly antiquated, it is preparing to come to life again to be the site of realized ideals and as a standard of the institution that is The Ohio State University.

Companies join to develop
OSU information displays

BTG International Inc. and Taiwan's Union Chemical Laboratories of the Industrial Technology Research Institute (ITRI) announced a collaboration agreement yesterday to further develop information displays patented by Ohio State.

Arthur Epstein, a professor of physics and chemistry and director of the Center for Materials Research, and his research team developed light emitting plastic devices known as Symmetrically Configured A/c Light Emitting (SCALE) Devices. They could be used to create flexible video screens.

"We carry out a basic research program into why some plastics will emit light when you connect them to a battery," Epstein said. "From that basic research program came inventions of two ways of making light emitting devices."

Epstein said he believes problems exist with current display screens for cell phones, dashboards and televisions.

"Such displays are great but can often only be viewed at certain angles, and they are basically filters for a white light behind them," he said. "Our plastics actually give off light themselves so there's no back-light."

Examples of this technology have been produced, but none were available at yesterday's collabora-

tion announcement. The two companies hope to develop displays that can be rolled up and put into one's pocket.

"Imagine you had a pin with a bar on it attached to a display," Epstein said. "Pull out the bar, there's your display in front of you. Download information you need, whether it be e-mail or reading a book, newspaper or map. Then you can have a whole view of technology for most anything you like."

BTG, a global technology commercialization company, and ITRI hope to commercialize such products and technology, but it will be some time before such products hit the shelves.

"We're talking maybe in about three years the initial prototypes will be made and one more year actually hit the market place," Epstein said. "There's a lot that has to be done because you have to develop the techniques."

OSU president Karen A. Holbrook said it will take several years for the university to receive revenue from this technology.

Epstein and his research team developed the technology and filed the patents in the late 1990s. BTG later contacted them in hopes of acquiring the rights to work with the technology.

"They saw the vision of how it could have a large impact and then licensed the technology from OSU," Epstein said. "Taking it from the examples that we produce now to materials we can turn into a device that is cost effective with the right

brightness, lifetime and colormax is a lot of development work, way beyond what you'd want in an academic lab."

BTG negotiated for over a year with OSU for the rights to work with the technology, said Bryan Yearwood, the vice president of licensing at BTG.

Epstein's research team included 15 OSU undergraduate and graduate students. Most study physics, but some study chemistry, chemical engineering, biomedical engineering and empirical sciences.

"The field is interdisciplinary because you have to understand why things work, and then understand from that how to modify the materials to enhance the properties," Epstein said.

Physics doctoral students Wesley Pirkle and Jeremy Bergeson are uncertain of their futures with the product.

"There have not been a lot of breakthroughs in recent years, and it's not controlled by us any more," Bergeson said.

A crowd of approximately 60 people attended the announcement, including members of the OSU Senate, business executives, researchers and Holbrook. This collaboration represents a strong international agreement and demonstrates OSU's technological and research capabilities, Holbrook said.

"The most important thing is forging these kinds of relationships and developing partnerships," she said.

and act so sincere about it," he said. "(You'd) turn around and come to find out he's just joking."

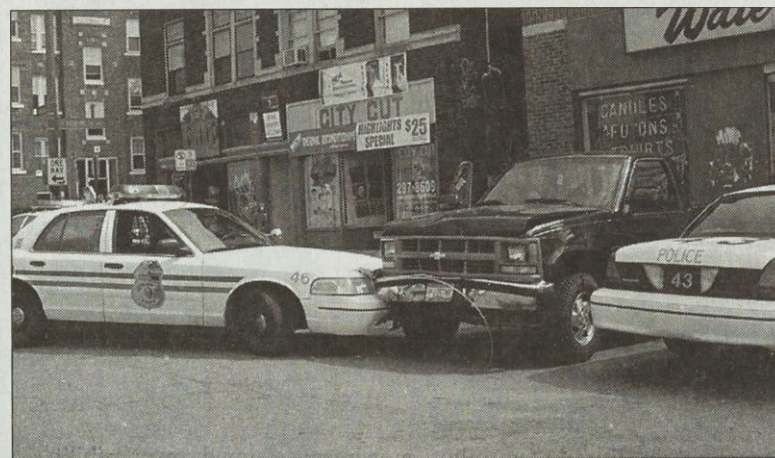
One of his common gags was to joke about not liking people.

concrete."

Two police officers involved in the crash where Temple was apprehended were slightly injured and taken to Ohio State Medical Center, said Sgt. Jeff Barnes. Barnes was on duty at the West Norwich Avenue and North High Street intersection, which was blocked off after Temple was arrested at about 10:30 a.m.

No other injuries were reported in the other crashes, Det. Russell Redman said.

Barnes said possible charges could include assault with a motor vehicle, resisting arrest and fleeing the scene of a crash.

Violence continues while Palestinians not dismantling

JERUSALEM — Israeli troops demolished the West Bank home of a teenage suicide bomber yesterday, after two bombing attacks prompted Israeli warnings that peace moves will fail if the Palestinians do not start dismantling militant groups.

Two Israelis were killed and 11 wounded in Tuesday's attacks, the most serious violations yet of a cease-fire declared by Palestinian militant groups June 29.

Palestinian officials blamed Israel, saying it has not lived up to its obligations under a U.S.-backed peace plan and instead engaged in provocative acts, such as continued military raids.

"Israel is the side responsible for the escalation," Palestinian Information Minister Nabil Amr said after talks in Amman, Jordan, between Palestinian Prime Minister Mahmoud Abbas and U.S. envoy William Burns.

Burns, a U.S. State Department official, met Tuesday in Jerusalem with Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon.

In Israel, police said they were on nationwide alert for suicide bombings yesterday, setting up roadblocks to head off any further attacks. Israel Army Radio said intelligence sources had warnings of 21 impending attacks — up from seven or eight daily warnings a week ago — but a police spokesman would not say how many warnings had been received.

Tuesday's blasts, in an Israeli town and at a West Bank bus stop used by Jewish settlers, killed two Israelis and wounded 11. The two attacks were 11 miles apart and occurred within an hour of one another but were unrelated, police and army officers said.

In response, Sharon said, "There can be no peace with terror."

Sharon said the attacks were the result of a "complete lack of Palestinian action" in dismantling militant groups like Hamas and Islam-

ic Jihad, as required by the "road map" peace plan.

As long as the Palestinians refuse to take action, "it will be impossible to move forward" on the road map, he said.

In an interview with the *French daily Le Figaro*, Sharon said the Palestinian Authority must arrest and punish the planners of terror attacks, ban militant groups and round up weapons. The arms should be removed from the Palestinian areas and destroyed, he said.

Sharon also urged Abbas to block Arafat's continued influence over the security forces. "He (Abbas) needs to take control of the money and the payment of salaries," Sharon told *Le Figaro*.

However, Israeli officials refrained from threatening large-scale military retaliation, indicating that they want the relative calm to be restored.

Hamas and a faction loosely linked to Yasser Arafat's Fatah movement claimed responsibility for the attacks.

Arms dealer tries to sell missiles to FBI informant

NEWARK, N.J. — A suspected arms dealer was arraigned yesterday on federal charges that he allegedly tried to sell shoulder-fired missiles to an undercover agent posing as a Muslim terrorist bent on shooting down an airliner.

Hemet Lakhani, 68, a Briton described as a "significant international arms dealer," was ordered held without bail pending a custody hearing Monday. He is charged with attempting to provide material support and resources to terrorists and acting as an arms broker without a license.

His lawyer refused to comment on the case after the hearing.

Another defendant, Moinuddeen Ahmed Hameed, was ordered held without bail pending an Aug. 20 hearing on charges of conspiring to operate an unlicensed money transmitting business. Officials also announced charges against a third man, Yehuda Abraham, who was to be arraigned in New York yesterday on money laundering charges.

"The terrorists who have threatened America lost an ally in their attempts to

kill our citizens," U.S. Attorney Christopher J. Christie in a news conference following the hearing.

Lakhani was arrested Tuesday at a hotel near Newark International Airport, where officials said he had flown from London to close the deal on a sophisticated Russian SA-18 Igla missile capable of bringing down commercial airliners.

According to an FBI affidavit filed to support the charges, Lakhani also asked for a commitment from the Russian "suppliers" — actually undercover Russian agents — for 50 more missiles to be sent to the United States by Aug. 30 and also said he was interested in purchasing a ton of C-4 plastic explosive.

Christie described Lakhani as a "significant international arms dealer."

Abraham, Christie said, accepted an initial \$30,000 down payment on behalf of Lakhani, and presumably got it overseas to accounts controlled by Lakhani, while Hameed was only recently brought into the plot to help launder the expected \$500,000 down payment for 50 missiles.

Authorities in the United States, Britain and Russia cooperated in the investigation, which began months

ago with a tip that the dealer was seeking weapons to buy in St. Petersburg, Russia, several U.S. law enforcement officials said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The Muslim extremist who wanted the missile actually was an FBI informant and the weapon was an inoperable copy brought from Russia to the United States aboard a ship to make the deal seem real, officials said.

The two men believed to be involved in money laundering, Hameed and Abraham, were apprehended about the same time at what was described as a gem dealership just off Fifth Avenue in New York, according to a federal law enforcement official who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Lakhani is not believed to be connected to al-Qaida or any other known terrorist group, federal officials say. Authorities also stressed that there was no specific, credible threat to shoot down an airliner in the United States.

But one official said the understanding between Lakhani and the undercover FBI agent was that the missile needed to be capable of bringing down a commercial airliner.

Kung-fu martial artists shoot, score

There are some things that just go hand in hand — peanut butter and jelly, Axl and Slash and, oddly enough, Kung-fu and soccer.

Kung-Fu and soccer? Maybe this is not the most likely of combinations, but in “Shaolin Soccer,” director Stephen Chow matches the two to sometimes humorous, sometimes strange effect. It is safe to say “Shaolin Soccer” will be the only film of its kind moviegoers will come across in the theater this summer.

In the 1983 Super Cup Final, Golden Leg (Ng Man Tat) misses a penalty shot losing the match for his team and inspiring the crowd to take the field and pummel him, breaking his sweet leg. Fast forward to the present where Golden Leg is a down and out lackey for former teammate and owner of the champion Team Evil. Crippled and drunk, Golden Leg limps through the street where he runs into young Shaolin master Sing (Stephen Chow), who has made it his lifelong goal to bring the people his message of kung-fu’s many virtues. He even sights real life martial arts proponent Bruce Lee as a model.

Shaolin, by the way, is a martial arts style, which, as Sing explains, is the basis for all martial arts. Sing says if people learned the secrets of this form, they would be able to apply martial

arts to solve everyday problems, making life easier for all. The two decide to form an alliance combining Sing’s Shaolin mastery and Golden Leg’s soccer skill to win the Super Cup Final. Golden Leg will get revenge against his former teammate, and Sing will get his message out.

It is important to mention there are many conventions in popular Asian cinema, which are completely foreign to a Western audience. They are some of the same things one might find in Asian animation or comic art. For instance, actors might break out into an impromptu line dance. On top of this, there were dozens of jokes and lines which do not really translate to another culture. Cartoon-like violence and strange use of CGI were among the things a newcomer to this type of cinema might find foreign. There was one instance in which the Shaolin soccer team faces off against a team of very attrac-

tive females decorated with male facial hair. This was one of the many instances where a cultural translator would have been of great benefit. These were the things, though, which kept the film fun.

Golden Leg and Sing set off to get Sing’s brothers from the Shaolin Temple back together in a series of scenes very reminiscent of the “Blues Brothers.” (“We’re getting the band back together”). The brotherhood has grown old and fat, but after some convincing, Sing is able to reunite with his old friends and enter the tournament.

What ensues is a cross between the American underdog sports film (“Mighty Ducks,” “Bad News Bears”) and Asian kung-fu (“Enter the Dragon”). The result is strange and oddly entertaining.

The acting is a different story. The dialogue is dubbed and extremely distracting — think “Godzilla.” It is difficult to determine the quality of the acting with the dubbed voices. The novelty wore off in no time, and the goofy dubbing quickly became grating. There is virtually nothing of lasting cinematic worth to be found in the film. The most compelling special effects were children of “The Matrix,” so no ground was broken in this arena either.

Not much can be said for the film’s cinematic elements, but as a change of pace, “Soccer” might be worth the price of admission.

Loyal fans remember ‘the King’

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Elvis Presley might have become a decent actor if manager Tom Parker hadn’t been so eager to cash in on a string of lackluster movies, says a songwriter who created music for some of the films.

Mike Stoller and partner Jerry Leiber, authors of the title song for the movie “Jailhouse Rock,” wrote more than 20 songs recorded by Presley, including his No. 1 hit “Hound Dog.” With Stoller handling the music and Leiber providing the lyrics, they also contributed many songs to the Presley movie soundtracks.

Stoller, 70, met with Elvis fans who crowded into the Presley estate’s Beale Street club Monday night to watch “Jailhouse Rock” and begin a weeklong observance of the 26th anniversary of the death of the King of Rock ‘n’ Roll.

Presley longed to be a serious actor but Parker, who adopted the title “Colonel,” did nothing to help him, Stoller said.

“Unfortunately, the Colonel had the golden goose and he wanted him to keep cranking it out,” Stoller said.

Presley starred in 31 movies between 1956 and 1969, each a work only Elvis fans could love.

Stoller said he never understood why Presley gave Parker so much control over his life and career. Many of Parker’s decisions appeared to be more for his own benefit than for Presley’s — taking 50 percent of the star’s income for management fees, while the industry standard was 10 to 20 percent.

“The Colonel’s only interest was the Colonel’s,” Stoller said. “Elvis was merely a vehicle for the Colonel’s greed.”

Presley was 42 when he died Aug. 16, 1977, of drug abuse and heart disease at his Memphis residence. The house, Graceland, now draws more than 600,000 tourists a year.

Graceland is the center of an annual string of parties, fan get-togethers and memorials focused on the death anniversary. Over the week, estate managers expect up to 4,000 people a day to tour Graceland and for even more to shop at its complex of souvenir stores and museums.

The week’s highlight is a candlelight procession past Presley’s grave in a garden beside Graceland. Beginning tomorrow

night and running into the next day, it often draws 15,000 to 20,000 fans.

This year, the fans also will celebrate the 35th anniversary of Presley’s 1968 TV special “Elvis,” which marked his return from Hollywood to the concert stage. It’s also the 30th anniversary of his 1973 TV special broadcast around the world, “Elvis: Aloha from Hawaii.”

Like many other fans, Canadians Jocelyne Menard, 56, and Denise Dumaine, 58, attend every Elvis anniversary they can. And they leave their husbands behind in Montreal.

“They don’t love it like us. They cannot share like us, so we come together,” Menard said.

Susan Ritter, 31, a budding singer from Dayton, Ohio, made her first Memphis visit hoping to pick up some Elvis pointers on pleasing a crowd.

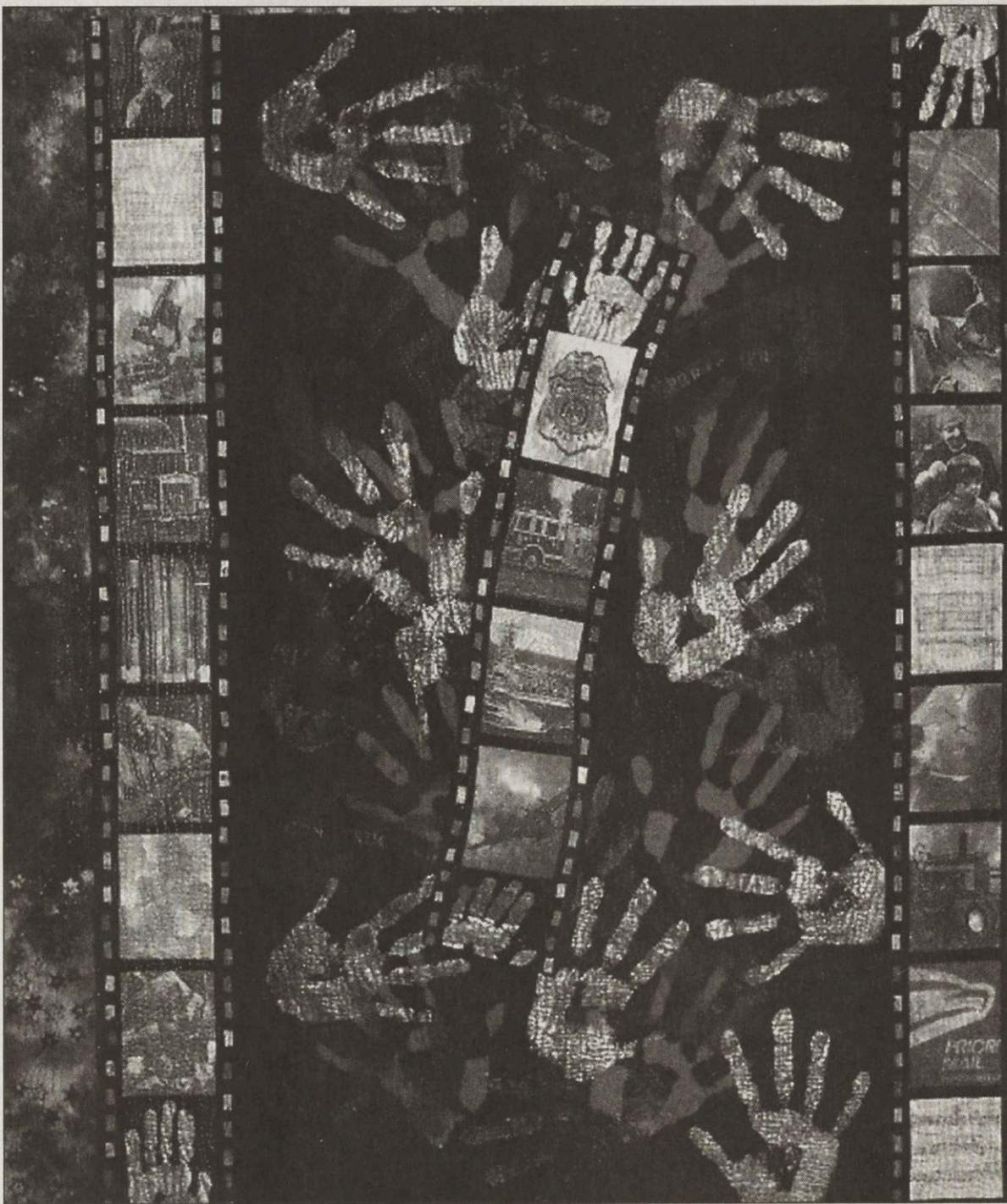
“I’ve never seen Elvis on a big screen before, so I’m really excited,” she said. “Elvis is like the consummate performer.”

Leiber and Stoller, 1987 inductees into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, wrote hundreds of songs for a long list of entertainers.

They got a major career boost and their first contact with Presley after he recorded “Hound Dog,” which Leiber and Stoller originally wrote for rhythm and blues singer Big Mama Thornton.

Stoller was on vacation in Europe when Presley recorded “Hound Dog.” On Stoller’s return, Leiber greeted him at the New York harbor.

“He said, ‘Hey man, we’ve got a smash hit,’” Stoller said. “I said ‘Big Mama Thornton’s record?’ He said, ‘No, some white kid named Elvis Presley.’ I said, ‘Elvis who?’”

Quilts turn to art, threads express life

When the word art comes to mind, visions of golden Van Gogh sunflowers and Monet’s serene water lilies are not far behind. But it is not always within these traditional mediums that one can find artistic beauty.

“Sacred Threads,” an exhibition of art quilts, is a perfect example of turning the ordinary into works of art. The exhibition is on display at the Concourse Gallery in Upper Arlington.

“Sacred Threads,” an association of quilters from the United States and Canada, features quilts with four themes: spirituality, inspiration, healing and grief, said Lynette Santoro-Au, arts manager of the Concourse Gallery.

“The artists express their life struggles and their life experiences in the quilts they make,” Santoro-Au said.

The Upper Arlington exhibit — consisting of about 25 quilts — is part of a larger “Sacred Threads” exhibit, which took place at Reynoldsburg High School in June.

Santoro-Au, Emily Cable, an intern at the gallery, and Bob Argo, a visual communications committee member at the gallery, had the task of choosing the quilts for their show.

“The Reynoldsburg exhibit featured about 180 to 200 quilts,” Cable said. “We selected to have these 25 in our show.”

Santoro-Au said they chose the quilts based on the subject matter, quality and stories behind them.

“There’s something very comforting about fiber shows. In ours, we wanted to represent something from each of the ‘Sacred Threads’ themes,” she said.

“‘Sacred Threads’ came to us last October looking for a venue,” Santoro-Au said. “We are happy to have the quilts here.”

Cable said most of the quilts were made in the last decade and will appeal across demographics.

“The exhibit is a safe environment for spiritual quilts and an open welcoming for people of various religions,” she said.

With art quilt exhibits at the

Concourse Gallery, Ohio State and the Ohio State Fair and recent quilt exhibits at the Ohio County Historical Museum, the Riffe Gallery and in Reynoldsburg, quilt displays in Ohio appear to be a trend.

There are two reasons why there are so many quilt exhibits featured in Ohio right now, said Eva Bradshaw, curator of the Ohio State quilt exhibit, “Ohio Pioneers of the Art Quilt.”

“The National Quilting Association conference was held in Columbus in June and many quilters were in Ohio for that conference, and the second reason is Ohio’s Bicentennial,” Bradshaw said.

“Quilting is very popular now, and historically it has gone through various cycles of being popular to waning to a return to popularity,” she said. “The current trend started in the 1970s and has continued to grow since then.”

Santoro-Au said the quilts have been very well received.

“The quilt exhibit has been very successful,” Santoro-Au said. “The only complaint I’ve heard is, ‘I wish there were more of them.’”

The Concourse Gallery is located in the Upper Arlington Municipal Building, 3600 Tremont Road. Gallery hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday-Friday. Admission is free.

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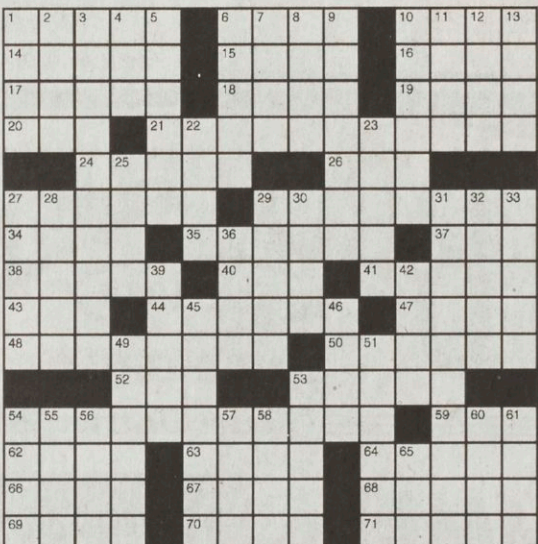

Buckeye offense returns seniors, revs up to strut stuff this season

If potential Heisman Trophy candidate Maurice Clarett has any motivation to rejoin his team, it could start with the five guys that clear a path for him every time he touches the ball.

In its College Football Yearbook, the Sporting News rated the Buckeyes' offensive line as the number one unit in the nation for a good reason. The Buckeyes' front line is made up of five returning starters, all of whom are seniors with a wealth of experience. Together, the group has combined for 110 starts.

"It really helps playing with these guys for so many years. Guys like Bryce (Bishop) and Alex (Stepanovich) and I have basically played two, three years together," right tackle Shane Olivea said. "For us, it is just a point of doing what we do better."

Adrien Clarke and Ivan Douglas complete the five players on a line that has an average height of 6 feet 4 inches, and an average weight of 315 pounds.

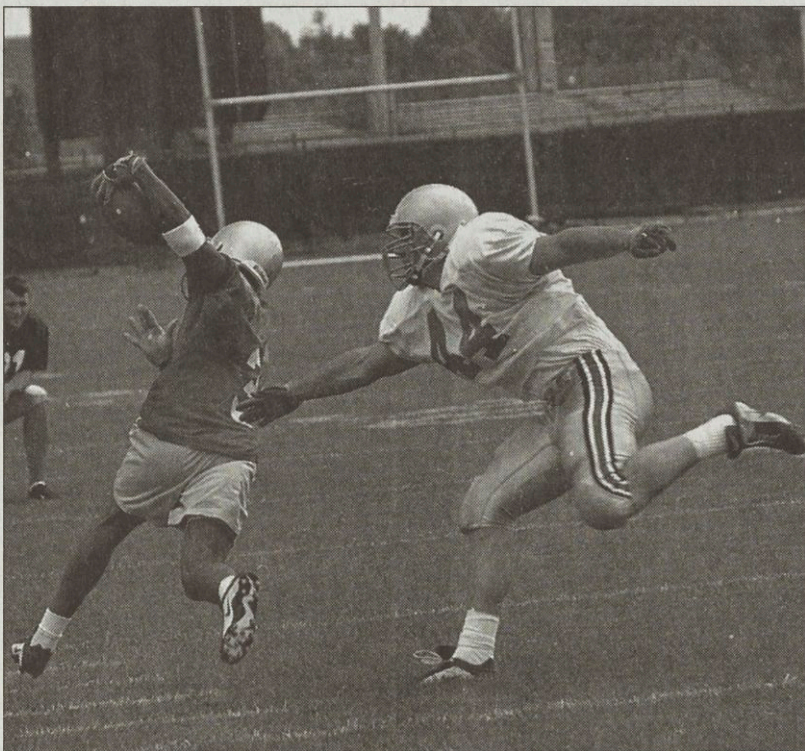
Olivea said he thinks this is the best offensive unit the Buckeyes have had since he has been here. He said one advantage the team has in its favor is a lot of experienced returning players.

"We've been very fortunate this year with the amount of guys returning back, it is not like we have to reteach everything. Guys know the system, and it is really all about getting the younger guys acquainted with the system," Olivea said.

Going into the Fiesta Bowl last year, the offensive line had the mentality they would not face any defensive lineman in the game who was any better than what they face every day in practice. Since Sunday — the first day of full-contact practice — the two lines have been going head to head once again.

"I really haven't faced a team that has an offensive line like ours," defensive end Will Smith said. "I think they make us better, and we make them better. They are good at their techniques, and are big, physical guys, and bigger than the average team we play. Going against them everyday makes the games a little bit easier."

Aside from senior leadership, the offensive line has talent and depth at every position. Left tackle Robbie Sims and center Nick Mangold played crucial minutes as true freshmen last year and will challenge for more playing time this year. Also in the mix are right tackles Mike Kne, Doug Datish, T.J. Downing, who was moved from tight end to tackle last year and Adam Olds who is progressing well after hip surgery. Kne, Datish and Downing were redshirt freshmen last year.

The number one thing offensive coordinator and offensive line coach Jim Bollman looks for in his linemen is the ability to finish plays more consistently and hustle

through an entire football game, he said. He said he is pleased with the pride his line takes in what they are doing.

"When you do the same things for a decent period of time, and you can keep doing them with the same amount or more enthusiasm, then you get better," Bollman said. "The main thing is the attitude that you put forth to what you do, and certainly this line has been together long enough that there is not a lot of assignment things that they are going to have problems with."

Bollman said one unusual thing about the offensive line is it is not about one guy, but about five guys that work together as a single unit. Bollman said it is easier on everybody to have so many guys back, but now, more than ever, the level of expectations is raised.

Stepanovich and Olivea are both candidates for lineman awards. Stepanovich is up for the Rimington Award and Olivea for the Outland Trophy.

Foster, Matter bring gold medal back to U.S.

With two Ohio high school state championships and the 2000 Ms. Ohio Basketball award to her credit, there isn't much Ohio State junior guard Caitly Matter hasn't done on the court.

But Matter was the first to admit that nothing compared to last week when she brought home a gold medal for the United States in the 2003 FIBA World Championship for Young Women.

"That ranks at the top of everything," Matter said. "Just getting to experience playing in a competition like that is something, but when you stand up on the podium and hear the national anthem, words can't describe it."

Matter wasn't the only Buckeye to experience the thrill of winning the world's top prize. Women's basketball coach Jim Foster, who was named the coach of the USA team earlier in the spring, brought home his fifth gold medal in international competition as his squad went 7-1 in the 12-team competition held July 25-Aug. 3 in Sibenik, Croatia.

Although it wasn't his first time on the top step of the medal stand, Foster, who is 27-4 at the helm of USA Basketball teams, said this year's win was just as special as any other.

"When you win a gold medal, it's a great feeling," Foster said. "It was a great experience for me as a coach."

Team USA's lone loss came in the preliminary round when it fell to Brazil 73-60. But the Americans gained the ultimate retribution when they beat the Brazilians 71-55 in the gold medal contest.

"The tournament was successful beginning to end," Foster said. "I had a very coachable group of players; they all put their egos in the proper place and shared the basketball and learned to talk and communicate with each other. It was a fun group to walk in the gym with."

While the team had only a few months to prepare for the tournament, Foster said his team quickly gelled together.

"I liked the fact that 12 players, with so much emphasis being on

the individual now in basketball, understood that we needed to work as a team," Foster said. "It's difficult for the players to get cohesion, but our ability to share the ball and play all 12 players allowed us to have tremendous defensive emphasis."

Matter averaged 15.4 points per game for the Buckeyes last season, but scored just under six points per contest in international play. However, the second team All-Big Ten selection was not disappointed with her play.

"Just being around the other girls was the best," Matter said. "It was a great learning experience having to play defense against the top players from throughout the world."

While the tournament featured a number of collegiate players, both Matter and Foster recognized the differences between NCAA and FIBA play.

"It's a lot more physical in the international game," Matter said. "There's some moving screens, over the back and grabbing of jerseys that you just have to get adjusted to a little bit."

Foster said he believed the competition will help Team USA's 12 players in their upcoming collegiate season.

"It was a good opportunity for them to develop some leadership skills this summer," Foster said. "It was an opportunity for them to get better stepping up against some of the best players in the world."

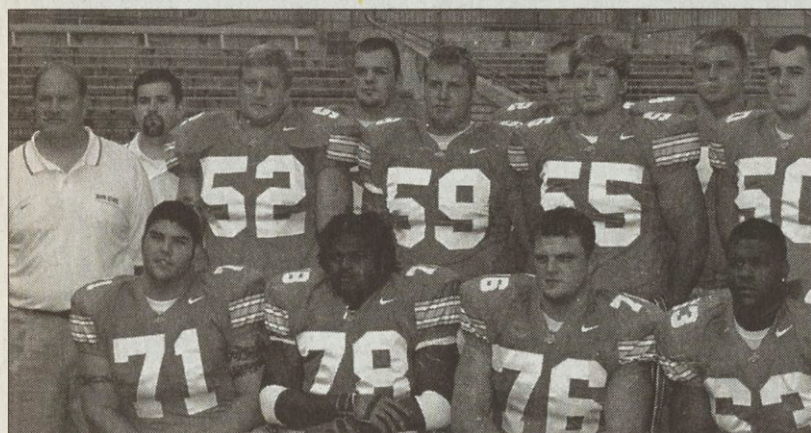
Like her coach, Matter hopes this summer's competition will help her when the Buckeyes take the court.

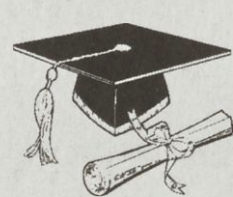

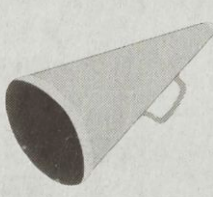
