

# Best Practices for Attributing a Creative Commons Licensed Work

Authors and creators use Creative Commons licenses to set terms of use for their works. This guide will demonstrate one term found in all Creative Commons licenses: attribution. In general, your attribution statement should include:

- **Author**
- **Title** of the work, if supplied
- **Source** of the work
- Text or link to **CC license** under which the work is shared
- Copyright **notice** and **disclaimer** of warranties, if supplied
- **Modifications** made

Attribution can be made in any reasonable manner based on the medium, means, and context in which you plan to share the work. The elements listed above can be incorporated into the citation style for your discipline.
